POST MORTEM EXAMINATION. Mr. Wilson Henderson, who has been in hopeless condition for several months past, hied on Tuesday morning last, at his home, about three and one-half miles west of Corvallis. For six months preceding his death, Mr. Henderson had been suffering from a tumor of the abdomen, of gradually increasing size, the exact nature of which was very obscure, though it had been examined by several of our resident physicians. Permission for a post mortem examination having been obtained, Drs. 
