FUNERAL OF HON. W. B. CARTER.

The funeral of the late W. B. Carter, State Printer and editor of the GAZETTE, took place in this city at 3 P. M. on Monday, the 28th inst., from the city hall, under the auspices of Corvallis Lodge No. 14, A. F. and A. M., of which he had long been a zealous and honored member. R. P. Earhart, M. W. G. M. of the State of Oregon, officiating. At 12 o'clock the casket was uncovered at the late residence of deceased, and the friends and the public were allowed to visit and view the remains until 3 P. M., when they were taken charge of by the Masonic fraternity and carried to the city hall, where a touching and eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. W. T. Chapman, of the M. E. church of this city, of which the deceased had long been a consistent and upright member, after which the Masonic fraternity, the Corvallis fire department, with brethren from Albany, and a large concourse of citizens, followed to the residence of the late resting place in Crystal Lake cemetery. During the services at the hall the large audience room and galleries were filled to their utmost capacity, and when the procession started for the cemetery every conveyance that could be secured in the city was filled, and notwithstanding the fact that the distance was more than a mile, very many walked to the cemetery and back.

The pall bearers appointed from the members of Corvallis Lodge F. and A. M. were as follows: John Burnett, E. Woodward, Wm. Cress, F. A. Chapman, J. H. Lewis, J. R. Rowland, W. H. Goldson, J. M. Osburn.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by Corvallis Lodge A. F. and A. M., at their meeting on Monday:

WHEREAS, It has pleased the Supreme Ruler of the Universe, in His inscrutable wisdom, to call from his labors here on earth to his eternal home, our dearly beloved friend and brother the Honorable William B. Carter, who has just departed this life; therefore, be it

Resolved, That in the death of Brother Carter the State has lost one of her best and most upright citizens and an honorable and efficient officer, this county one of her oldest and most faithful friends, and this Lodge one of its most useful and valuable members, who by his every day walk and action exhibited the highest type of a Mason.

FAVORS THE PRINTER.—An exchange makes this strong point in favor of the printer: By the latest postal decision men can actually make money by getting their bills and statements of accounts printed. Statements of accounts and bills of sale when made out on paper having printed heading, can be sent by mail for one cent, if the envelope is left unsealed; whereas, if it is made out on unprinted paper, it will cost three cents. Thus by patronizing the printer two cents can be saved on every bill or statement that is sent through the mail.

AT THE FISHERIES.—From reports from Astoria we learn that the salmon run has not fairly commenced yet; but as the season is somewhat early, this is probably all right. The fishermen in and near Astoria are still on strike for sixty cents per fish and over a thousand men are idle. Eighty of them signed their names to a card in the Astorian, pledging themselves not to accept less than 60 cents a fish, and agreeing to leave in a body if any one of the members is discharged on account of the pledge. All the fishermen above Tongue Point have gone to work at the old rates.—Portland Bee, 15th inst.

OBSEQUES OF FRANCIS CONNOR.

The funeral services of Commodore Francis Connor, of the Oregon steamship line, took place at the first Unitarian church of San Francisco on Sunday, March 29th at 2 P. M.

The remains, enclosed in a heavy casket, were brought and deposited in front of the pulpit by the officers of the steamship line, in full uniform. Around the casket and pulpit was a profusion of choice and fragrant floral offerings, emblems and wreaths, including a ship composed of flowers.

Rev. Dr. McKaig, the officiating clergyman, read selections from the scriptures, and the choir chanted Psalm 23, "The Lord is My Shepherd." Then Mrs. Emma Harding Britten, standing in front of the pulpit, at the head of the casket, offered a most earnest, feeling and sweetly comforting invocation, tenderly expressed, for divine help and strength, after which she delivered a deeply impressive and touching sermon.

ELIQUENT FUNERAL ADDRESS.

Welcoming all present to assist in celebrating the birth of a noble soul into another and higher sphere of progressive life. She traced the faithful services of the deceased on a heroic coast, through more than a score of years, amid trying exposure and tempestuous experience, and alluded most touching to the fact that no mortal life ever trusted to his care had of him been lost. She expressed a tender and abiding faith in the immortality of the soul, claiming a future existence in spirit life as a sequence of the beautiful material world around us, every stone and tree, which when read right, is an enduring sermon teaching the love of a Good Father for his children. She closed by repeating the Lord's Prayer giving it a wealth of feeling and emotion which drew tears from many present.

The choir sang, "There is a Land of Pure Delight," and Rev. Dr. McKaig read some poetry, written in memoriam. After Mrs. Harding's address, Capt. Charles Goodale, assisted by the choir, had sung "Rock of Ages," the pastor pronounced the benediction. Three thousand people were in the church, and great numbers unable to get in passed through the aisles, when offered an opportunity to view the remains. A cortege of carriages, over four blocks in length, proceeded to the Odd Fellows' cemetery. Col. Peter Donahue, Capt. Charles Goodale, Joseph G. Eastland, A. W. Phillips, and other prominent merchants, and eight steamship officers, acted as pall-bearers.

The steam coasters of this coast have lost an accomplished seaman, and the community a good man.

CENSUS.—Henry P. Suksdorf, U. S. census supervisor for the district of Oregon, was in town on Thursday making arrangements for taking the census. He has divided the county into districts, designating the twenty by the precincts of the county. North and South Eugene, first; Pleasant Hill, Coast Fork and Cottage Grove, second; Fall Creek, Lost Valley and Middle Fork, third; Springfield and Willamette Falls, fourth; McKenzie, Camp Creek and Mouth fifth; Lancaster and Irving, sixth; Long Tom, Richardson and Siuslaw, seventh; T. C. Bell, E. P. Hecox, John H. Parker, J. E. Houston and Henry Baxter have been appointed enumerators. The other appointments we did not learn. The enumeration is to be completed during the month of June.—Eugene Journal.

OTHER RAILROAD.—Since our last issue we have been going on vigorously on the narrow gauge from Smithfield to Dallas. About two miles have been graded, and the grading on the whole this side of the grade yard is all driven. The pile-driver will be at work in a day or two on the La Creole. The bad state of the weather has hindered the work, but the contractors are determined to push it to completion, rain or shine, and are doing their best under the circumstances.—Polk County Itemizer.

THE MYSTERY DEEPENING.—In referring to the recent murder case, of which an account was given in our last week's issue, the Walla Walla Statesman says: Up to the time of going to press nothing more has transpired regarding the murder of Forsyth, or so since the postmaster here received that named Brumfield. This looks like conclusive evidence that it is the name of the murdered man. The only mystery now is to find out for certain which was Brumfield and which Thomas.

PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS.—The Astorian of the 2nd inst., says: The light-house board at Washington have recommended that \$75,000 be appropriated for a light-house on Sand Island, to be constructed of stone, etc., upland and screw piling. This is a move in the right direction.

Mr. Habersham returned to Portland yesterday, and we understand that Capt. G. W. Woods, of this city, will complete the surveys of the Columbia river bar, for which service Mr. Habersham was appointed by Col. Gillespie.

PUBLIC SCHOOL CLOSED.—The public school closed for the summer, yesterday evening. All of the public funds having been exhausted, and the debt over \$1,000, which hangs over the district, due teachers, being constantly augmented, this action was thought advisable by the directors. It is incomprehensible how a district that will tax itself 18 mills to provide a fine schoolhouse, will allow the same to go uncoupled, when by a paltry two mill tax a free school could be provided nine months of the year. If the school is allowed to remain closed, it will be a stigma upon our people.—Eugene Guard.

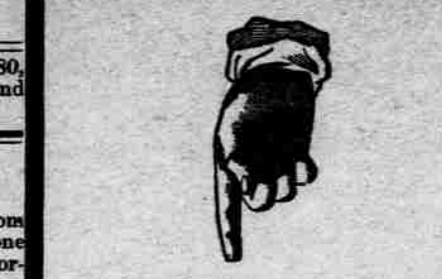
