In addition to the financial report, herewith submitted, I submit some statistics compiled from the Districts' reports, teachers' reports and from my own memoranda in visiting schools.

The highest number of organized districts, at present, in this county, is 55. The number of districts reporting this year, and now drawing public money, is 44.

Approximate value of school buildings, including school grounds, is \$23,600.00. Estimated value of school furniture belonging to the school houses, is \$725.00.

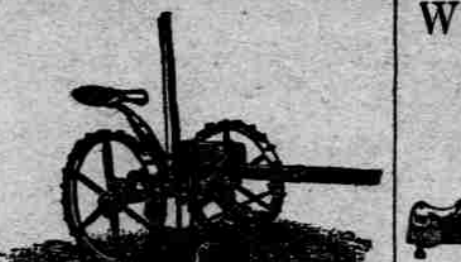
