STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

Upon its educational advantages, to a greater or less degree, depends the strength, prosperity and perpetuity of every country, State and Nation. It therefore becomes and is the duty of every person who has the good of his country at heart to look after the educational systems and institutions of his own immediate neighborhood first, and then, as opportunity offers, those in the more remote districts of his State. By an act of the Legislature of the State of Oregon, the Agricultural College of the State of Oregon was permanently located at Corvallis, and what was then Corvallis College, under the care of the conference of the M. E. Church South, was designated as the Agricultural College of the State, upon the said Corvallis College accepting certain conditions contained in and out of the Legislature, which conditions were duly accepted.

At the time of the location of the Agricultural College, Corvallis College owned a school building about equal to an ordinary district school house and a patronage that scarcely afforded a support for two professors. The State Agricultural College now owns a college building that is a credit to the county in which it is situated, having been built by the people of Benton County, a farm of 35 acres adjoining the city limits of Corvallis, purchased by the citizens of the same county, and supports four competent professors, and still has several hundred dollars in the treasury. Of course the present prosperous condition of this institution is owing to State aid in the past, but the College to-day is a self-sustaining institution.

The last Legislature made a nominal appropriation for the Agricultural College, but the amount appropriated was less than the amount now in the treasury, so that for two years the College has actually accumulated money. Of the management of this College and the ability of its professors, too much can not be said of a common-sense nature, but the high reputation of the school, both at home and abroad, speaks in more forcible language than our pen can give. Truly the people of Benton County have been to congratulate themselves in raising this institution, and we trust that they will not neglect the privileges they now enjoy, but will at the commencement of the coming year give this College the patronage its merits deserve.

THE HANCOCK CLUB.

Last Saturday evening a number of the citizens of Corvallis met at a meeting of the Hancock Club, at the Court House in this city, with the object of organizing a new club. J. R. Bryson, George Brock, and other gentlemen. The faithful were assembled at their duty, and a cordial invitation was extended to the public, generally, and the ladies in particular.

At the hour appointed the Court House bell was rung and for half an hour thereafter the faithful janitor waited amid death-like stillness for the coming of the orators and audience; at the expiration of the usual hour the Court House bell once more announced that it was time to commence the exercises of the evening. When the number on the steps had reached fourteen and the hour of the evening was about three-quarters of eight, the Court House bell was rung, and the exercises of the evening commenced by the election of Mayor (as he is chairman, Mr. Bryson then proceeded to address the meeting, and at the close of his remarks Mr. McClellan was called for and consented to bring with an earnest and appropriate exhortation; during the speaking several other persons came in and by dint of "sitting while" the Court House bell was rung being occupied, until Dr. Farns was called out and his bench was left vacant, and about the same time the small boys, who had doubtless earned their retainer, also left this vacating bench, and the Court House bell was rung once at a time, nor was this meeting an exception to that rule, for the man whose duty it was to start the applause, being a little how come you so mistook an unorganized Republican for the Democratic promoter and made so many mistakes as to the time for applause that the President was compelled to call him to order, and becoming offended he also left this vacating bench, and shortly after this the meeting closed.

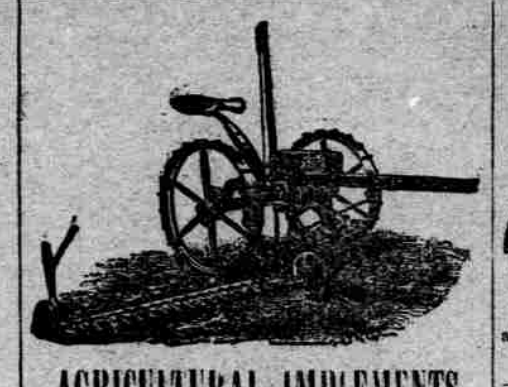
