SUICIDE.—From a letter from J. M. Laferty at Junction City, we learn the following particulars of the suicide of Nate Griswold, a saloon keeper of that city. The deceased had been addicted to the too frequent use of strong drink, and for two or three days before his death had shown signs of insanity, and on the morning of the 16th, about 2 o'clock, he committed the fatal deed by cutting his throat with a razor, almost severing the head from the body. A coroner's inquest was held and a verdict rendered in accordance with the facts above stated. The remains were taken charge of by the I. O. O. F. and buried that afternoon at the cemetery below Harrisburg. The deceased leaves a wife and one child and two sisters to mourn his untimely death.
