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NATIONAL REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The following is the platform passed by the recent Republican convention held at Chicago: Republicanism rests upon a solid basis; payment in coin for all the national obligations, and has given us a currency absolutely good and legal and square with our extended country.

Without resorting to loans, it has, since the war, defrayed the ordinary expenses of the government, besides the accruing interest on the public debt and disbursed annually more than \$200,000,000 for soldiers' pensions.

First.—We affirm that the work of the last 21 years has been such to commend itself to the favor of the nation, and that the fruits of the costly victories which we have achieved through immense difficulties should be preserved, that the discovered gold now hoarded in the vaults of the nation should be put to use for the benefit of the people.

Second.—The constitution of the United States is the supreme law, and no state contract of confederated states. It makes a sovereign nation. Some powers are denied to the nation, while others are retained in the states, but the powers between the powers delegated and those reserved is to be determined by national and not by state tribunals.
