THE REPUBLICAN RALLY.—Last Saturday evening being the time previously fixed that Senator Mitchell would speak in Corvallis. The Republicans also fixed the same time to ratify the recent Republican victories in Ohio and Indiana, and the occasion was one that made itself felt on the political circles of Corvallis. A large delegation from the Garfield and Arthur Club of Albany were present in uniform; about 500, a large number of Republican voters carrying lighted torches and headed by the Second Brigade Band marched through the street stopping at the Occidental Hotel, where they were joined by the speakers of the evening, and thence to the City Hall which by this time was well filled by an expectant crowd. The Garfield and Arthur Club then furnished some excellent vocal music, after which, Senator Mitchell was introduced and for two hours and a half held the audience as if spell bound. The large audience room and the gallery of the City Hall were filled to their utmost capacity, as well as the aisle, and very many persons were compelled to go away for want of room. A high compliment to Senator Mitchell's speech was a large number of persons remained standing throughout the whole two and a half hours; after the conclusion of the speech a procession was formed bearing torches; this procession was the largest ever in Corvallis, reaching over three blocks in length, and the torches were all carried by men over twenty-one years of age and not by small boys. The utmost decorum and good order was observed during the whole demonstration, but the Republicans showed by more ways than one the enthusiastic confidence they felt in the final result of the impending election. Benton county is good for Garfield and Arthur on the 24th of November next.

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.—Benjamin Freeland, a native of Maryland, a resident for many years of Indiana, and since 1853 a citizen of Linn county, Oregon, died on Friday evening last at the residence of his son, Dr. B. R. Freeland, in Albany. Father Freeland, as he was familiarly called, was a soldier in the war of 1812, and has over taken an active interest in the welfare of his country. Having seen his children's children to the fourth generation, he died in full possession of faith in the world's Redeemer, being in the 87th year of his age. Thus one by one the veterans pass away.
