To show that our teachers are alive to the importance and responsibility of their calling, and that they are earnestly trying to fit themselves for better work. In this way, the people will form a more correct opinion as to the value of teachers and to appreciate more highly the services of competent instructors. We therefore, cordially invite all friends of education to attend the meetings of the institute and encourage by their presence, our teachers to nobler work and higher effort. We hope that all teachers, and those who expect to teach, will be present and aid in making the institute on the 27th and 28th inst., a complete success in the cause of education.
