Each party chosen from the lists furnished T. J. Buford, is expected to pay \$1.50, whether he participates or not, in the event he is chosen on the losing side. The captains will choose up from these lists on Monday evening, Dec. 20th. No member of the hunt will know which side he is on until the official count is made by the ex. committee.
