PORTLAND AND THE OREGONIAN.

In the Daily Oregonian of the 17th Inst., in a contributed article entitled "The Real Estate Market," We find the following unkind comments:

"The Yaquina Railroad Co. is reported to have floated its bonds in New York. Some who are well acquainted with Yaquina Bay, inform us that an enormous expense will be required to make it an available shipping port. Be that as it may, we have no fear that it will work any harm to Portland. Concentrated wealth and well cemented commercial ties are hard things to move or to fight, and Portland has both. Possibly it is a number of capitalists would unite and expend a hundred millions in building up another city at some point on the sound, or even at Yaquina Bay, with another hundred millions to make the chosen site available, a real rivalry might arise."

It is a common thing to find comments like the above appearing in the columns of the Oregonian some times in its editorials and at other times contributed by others of the big under the disguise of news, and many times mingled with other matters under an inappropriate title like the one under consideration.

This class of individuals among the whole lot of them do not appear to entertain a single idea concerning public improvements in the state except the same is to be made at Portland. In fact they neither advance or have any ideas concerning public improvements for the benefit of the whole state at large but among them the single idea appears to be common and that is only about Portland. If a piece of improvement is suggested to be done in any other part of the state the Oregonian which is taken and supported by all classes in all localities in place of pursuing a thorough public spirited course as it should do its ostensible editor or some of the ring who pretend to contribute news in the place of inquiring and considering whether or not such improvement will be for the general benefit of our young and growing state the first question they propound is. Will such improvement if finished injure Portland? "No we have no fear that it will work any harm to Portland." And then she will strike at the contemplated public enterprise a back handed lick probably by saying that "some who are well acquainted with Yaquina Bay" (and who never saw it and who probably are influenced by Portland capital in the interest of the ring) "inform us that an enormous expense will be required to make it an available shipping port," such a course by a public newspaper which claims to be published in the interest of the public generally is contemptible. An organ which claims to be a state paper should rise above individual interests and should endeavor to promote first the interests of the state at large and then interests of different localities.

We think we can safely speak for the other portion of the state in this that they do not wish Portland any harm but on the contrary they want her to continue to advance in importance as it has done heretofore, but while they entertain this commendable feeling toward Portland, they desire to see other portions of the state advance in proportion, and while it is not probable that other localities will advance equal in proportion to Portland on account of the concentrated capital there to assist her, yet we do think that it is for the interest of the whole state as well as Portland that other localities should be improved and grow to importance. How would it appear to the passing stranger to see Portland like the stall fed calf, pampered to unusual proportions, while other portions of the state dwindled into insignificance or remain without having a corresponding amount of improvement. Such a state of affairs would without doubt be characterized as unwise by every sensible man.

The course of the Oregonian adopted in trying to retard the progress of all other portions of the state in order to sustain Portland if it speaks of these matters as conveying the sentiment of Portland, it puts us in mind of the unfaithful boy who had been fed, sustained and reared in luxury and affluence by his too fond parents until he had arrived at the age of majority, after which he left the parental roof and treated with utter scorn and contempt those parents who had sustained him when without it he would have perished. It has been sustained by all other parts of the state from which their hard

earned earnings have annually flown in a continual stream for the last twenty five years into the tills of Portland the result of which is that Portland has grown to unusual proportions compared with other parts of the state and now when other portions dare think of improving their locality Portland, through the Oregonian, comes forward with unusual promptness to discourage and put a stop to such progress thus attempting to destroy the hands that have so long sustained and supported her.

We confidently believe that the contemplated improvement commencing at and extending from Yaquina bay when completed will not in any way injure or retard the progress of Portland for the reason that if the proper condition of affairs exist all other portions of the state including Portland will increase in proportion and importance as well while the Rail Road to Yaquina bay will undoubtedly take away a large portion of the produce of Oregon, yet the state with her over abundant facilities for agriculture, manufacturing and other industrial pursuits will undoubtedly improve to such an extent that Portland will still maintain her present commercial importance and suffer no inconvenience or harm on account of developments elsewhere.

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS.

The last days of May and first of June are set apart for the end of the College year. There are public examinations given by the various classes, in which the pupils declaim and recite, to the admiration of numerous audiences of their friends and acquaintances.

But to us the more interesting part by far are the public examinations of the advanced class in agricultural science. This year they had the added attraction of a committee of three members of the State Grange of Patrons of Husbandry. An attack was made some months ago on the management of the College by a resident in Marion county, on the ground that it was wrongly named, and that it had no title to be called an Agricultural College because of the general and wide range of the studies.

To this President Arnold and his colleagues replied that whilst they gave all the students the opportunity of improvement in general learning and literature, yet they paid special attention to the various subjects bearing on scientific farming, and they invited their assailant, in common with others, to attend this examination and judge for themselves. Hence the presence of the Grange Committee.

The examination was held on the 27th of May, and lasted from early morning till late at night, with necessary intervals for refreshment.

The senior class, of about 16 or 19 students were called on in turn, and read essays, and were examined in various subjects, such as rotation of crops, the chemical constituents of various soils, manures and fertilizers, draining, green crops and grasses, the comparative values of different farm products, the distinctive peculiarities and appropriate treatment of various breeds of horses, cattle and sheep. The audience contained a good many farmers, who had the opportunity given them, and used it freely, of putting searching questions to the students. The answers given showed a very fair knowledge of the subjects, and demonstrated that the teachers studied the great art of making their pupils think and reason, as well as learn by rote. When the examination was concluded Messrs. Minto and Bewick, two of the visiting committee, rose in turn to express their satisfaction at what they had seen and heard. It must have been very gratifying to the Professors that these unprejudiced judges, chosen as representative farmers, who showed their sense of the importance of their mission by coming long distances from their homes to fulfill it, should speak as they did. It was equally gratifying to those of the audience who took a real interest in the success of the College to hear the hearty expression of the desire of the President and his colleagues to accept from these practical men any suggestion calculated to still further improve the course of learning pursued.

We hold a strong impression that the Agricultural College is doing a good work, and we would urge the Professors to continue to use every effort to make agricultural science attractive to the students.—Oregon Colonist.

The genius who invented wooden tooth-picks for hotel use has made over \$50,000.

The Supreme-court of the United States has decided that parties buying policies of insurance upon the lives of individuals can only claim the amount of money actually due to them out of the policy. Any excess collected from a company can be recovered in a court of law by the heirs of the person insured. This decision, recently rendered, is a matter full of interest for parties who are in the speculative life insurance business. This little game, it would seem, has its limitations as a matter of profit. If the heirs of deceased persons whose lives have been heavily insured, do not take advantage of their opportunities they are not the style of her to which the country is accustomed.

The San Francisco papers describe a dangerous counterfeit in circulation in that city, and as it is likely they may be put in circulation here, we give the description. It is a five-dollar piece that bears the date of 1889, and at a casual glance seems as well milled as the genuine product of the mint, the impression on both sides being sharp and well defined. Its ring closely resembles that of gold. A slight scratch betrays the fact that the bogus piece is gold plated on some white metal some what harder than silver. In a very short time the plating wears off on the edges, exhibiting the counterfeit. A close inspection of the stars will betray the piece, as they are larger and not as mathematically accurate as those on the genuine. When new the bogus coin will deceive anyone but an expert.

A South Carolina plantation is to receive Chinese laborers from San Francisco by way of experiment. They are to be sent there under the watchful supervision of an overseer, who is to see to it that none of them take advantage of having their expenses paid to the Atlantic states to slip away and settle down among their countrymen in one of the large cities. If they prove desirable laborers others will probably follow.

The Servia, the latest great Cunarder, is 530 feet long, with a burden of 8,500 tons. Her engines are expected to work up to 10,500 horse power, and it is expected that she will make 20 miles an hour, or from Liverpool to New York in a week. She is built of steel throughout, and has an inner hull five feet from the outer one.

Another very destructive fire visited Quebec on the night of the 9th. Eight hundred buildings in the principal streets were destroyed. Losses five lives, and \$2,000,000. Several remarkable whirl winds were caused by the fire. Men were in some cases lifted off their feet. On the lower field, where most of the burnt out people have camped, with their saved goods, the fire followed the unfortunates and burnt up most of the goods piled on the grass. Burning shingles fell over the city and as far out as Maple avenue, ouring the night, endangering every part of town. Several incipient fires in different streets were suppressed by the vigilance of their occupants.

A telegram states that a hundred persons were killed and six injured by an earthquake which recently devastated a number of villages in the passaic of Ean, Armenia, Turkey.

Disastrous storms are reported in the Northwest; also in Kansas, and southwestern Missouri, and in Pennsylvania and the east.

A man fell 400 feet down a shaft in a Tombstone, Arizona, mine on the 9th, passing through inch boards at 100 feet, and was picked up in a basket at the bottom.

Sitting Bulls Sioux having starved nearly to death, now intend to send several of their chiefs to Washington to apply for a stated reservation where they may live and die in peace and without hardship.

The Marquis of Lorne doesn't get along very well with the Gladstone government, and will resign his position as Governor-General of Canada.

STATE ITEMS.

From the Dalles Mountaineer.

A large number of teams are crossing the mountains from the Willamette valley, on their way to the end of the railroad in eastern Washington and Oregon. Work on the narrow gauge road having been stopped, they are thrown out of employment.

The Northern Pacific is now finished to the vicinity of Spoken Falls.

Some 420 car wheels arrived on the Willamette for the shops.

Bridge carpenters are wanted to work on the Dayton branch.

The road between Umatilla and Pendleton will be 50 miles long.

There will be three more hydrants put up at the shops, making twenty in all.

The Good Templar Lodge of this city will join with the shop boys in celebrating the Fourth.

Road Master Shaw put on three more gangs of section men this week making 35 sections in all.

Two immense 10,000 gallon tanks have been made at the car shops during the week for Walla Walla.

About 10,000 rails have been shipped to the front during the present month, for the different extensions of the O. R. & N. Co's. road.

A conductor and three colored porters for the new Pullman sleepers have been in town for a number of days. They were sent from the east to take charge of the cars on this road.

There is not an express office in Grant county; hence the mail bags are used for the transportation of all valuables.

Grant county has 10 postoffices, and perhaps no other county in Eastern Oregon receives the amount of mail matter that Grant does.

Two of the new Palace Pullman coaches for the O. R. & N. Company have arrived at The Dalles and will be placed on the road without delay.

We notice by the Boise Democrat that the advance guard of immigration has reached that place on its way to Oregon. Several wagon loads of people camped there last week.

A notice is posted up around town calling for 200 men to work on the Dayton extension of the O. R. & N. Co's. road. Wages \$2.50 per day. Men enough cannot be obtained to push the work ahead as rapidly as desired.

Our Willow creek neighbors were visited last Friday with a hail storm that for a time threatened to tear up generally. The hail stones were the size of walnuts, and fell in such profusion, that with the accompanying rain, the whole section of country was in twenty minutes covered with water to the depth of three inches, and the hail was washed from the side hills into the creek, ton upon ton.

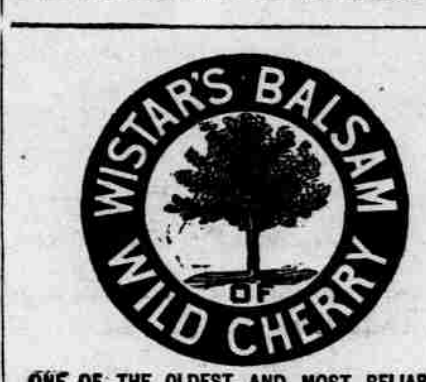
