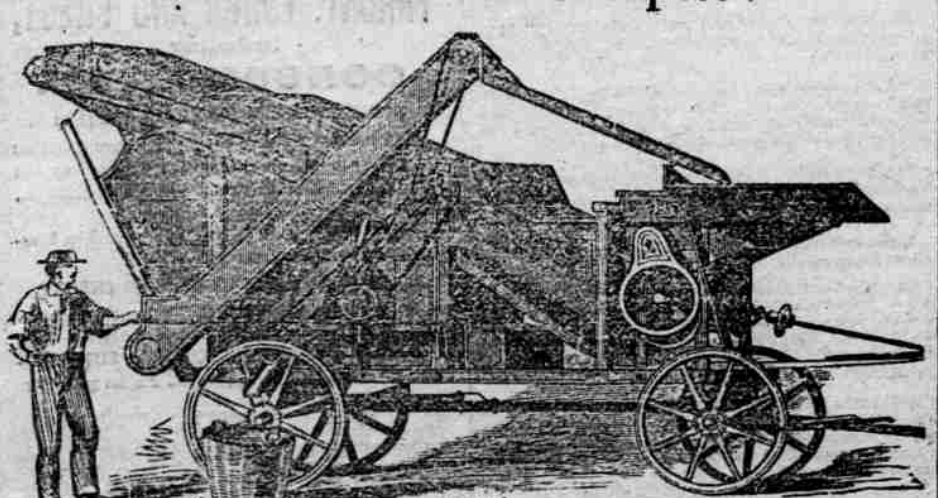

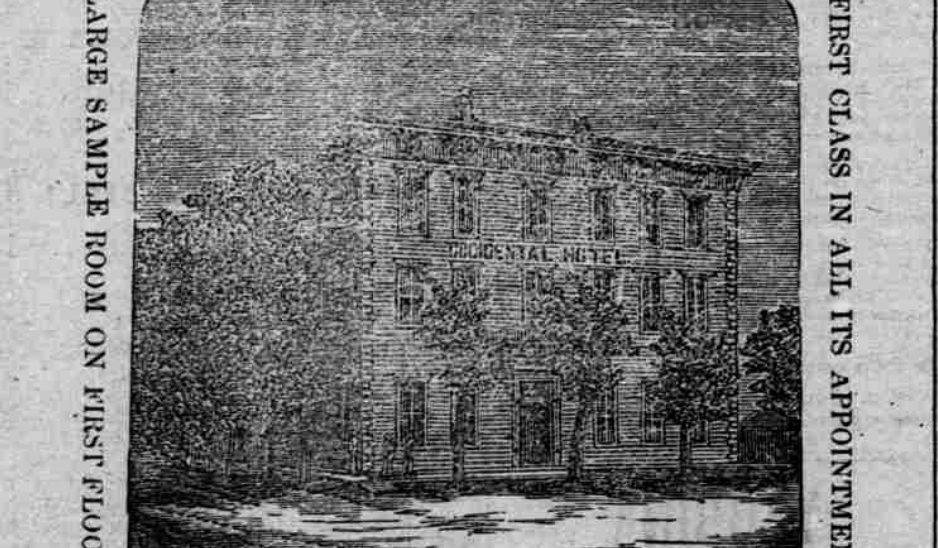

FROM THE OREGONIAN.

New York, June 22.—Ex-collector Mur-

phy is continuing his efforts to bring about

an amicable understanding between the

president and Gen. Grant. He is not so

anxious however, after reconciling the pre-

sident and Senator Conkling. Mr. Murphy

tells his friends that just after Mr. Garfield's

nomination at Chicago, he took Mr. Gar-

field to Gen. Arthur's room to meet Conk-

ling, and that Mr. Garfield waited there

four hours for Mr. Conkling but failed to

see him. Gen. Grant will not consent to

meet the president until the latter has more

satisfactorily explained his course.

The presentation of the citizen's purse of

\$250,000 to Gen. Grant is delayed for a few

days at his request.

Auditor French was in New York to-day

and had a conference with the U. S. district

attorney regarding the suit of the govern-

ment against the Central Pacific.

CLEVELAND, June 22.—Shortly after

3 o'clock this afternoon an east bound train

that the whole paragraph in which our name

occurs is a fabrication, and that not one of

the statements contained in it referring to you was

made or authorized by me. Sincerely, R. B.

Hayes." The ex-president had previously

written to president Garfield, disclaiming and

denying reports that had attributed to him any

reflection or adverse comments on the policy

or measures of the administration.

New York, June 22.—A Washington spe-

cial says the postmaster general has made a

large reduction in the cost of the postal ser-

vice of the starling routes, from Vienna, Indian

Territory, to Los Vegas, New Mexico. This
