THE PURCHASE OF CONFEDERATE BONDS BY NORTHERN CAPITALISTS.

Late dispatches indicate unmistakably that northern capital is being invested in confederate bonds. Brokers in New York last week telegraphed to Memphis bankers to send all that could be obtained for \$2 for each one thousand dollars, and the First National bank of that place responded by sending to them two hundred and thirty thousand dollars.

This is a matter about which the American people may do well to reflect. It undoubtedly is of much importance to them. For the simple reason that capital never seeks an investment, without a return much in excess of the original investment, is expected. The parties who are making these investments no doubt expect to reap a handsome profit by so doing.

It appears very evident that it is calculated to pursue one or the other of these methods. Either one is bad enough, and the American people should commence in time so as to be able to completely destroy such an infamous scheme. It may be said by some that the southern people have long ago abandoned the idea of having these bonds paid.
