## WASHINGTON LETTER.

[From our Regular Correspondent.] Washington, D. C., Jan. 25, 1882. Congress is a good deal puzzled and bothered with the Mormon question, which is forced upon the attention of that body by the contest for the seat of Delegate from Utah, There is no politics in the contest as both claimants are -Democrats; but the Territory, like some other Democratic localities, needs reorganizing. The proposition which has been made to divide it up and attach the parts to adjoining States and Territories is a good one and one that would break the power of Mormondom, for they would then be in a minority in each of the States - and amenable to their laws. Congress has been slow to take notice of the institution of polygamy, but now that the question is brought where it must be met, and now that the Republican party is in control; there is reason to hope that Mormonism is doomed. It was one of the original pled ges of the party to uproot this "twin-relic" with that of slavery. The points at issue in the election contest deserve to be clearly understood: Cannon, a confessed polygamist, undoubtedly received a majority at the election.
