WASHINGTON LETTER.

MEMORIAL SERVICES AT THE CAPITOL.

A DISTINGUISHED GATHERING.

Washington, D. C. Feb. 27, 1882. The Departments were closed today in honor of the memorial services to the late president. The crowd at the capitol was very large, but select, owing to the fact that none were. admitted without tickets. Among the distinguished personages present were the President of the United States, General Hancock, The Jus tices of the Supreme Court, Cabinet Ministers, foreign Ministers, Cabinet Officers, Officers of the Army and Navy of high rank, Senators, Representatives, besides many others who were so fortunate as to secure tickets of admission. The floor and galleries of the House of Representatives were filled to the atmost capacity, It was indeed a notable gathering of many whose names are already his torie. But no face in the vast and distinguished audience was so well known as that of the orator. James G. Blaine had entered the House contemporaneously with the dead President, he had been distinguished there, both as its presiding officer and as the leader of his party during the most trying and trouble us period of our legislative history, and he had enjoyed a wider and longer prosperity perhaps than any other public man. When he arose in front of the seat where he had so long presided as speaker of the House, and stood before that audience most of whom were his personal acquaintances and friends, seldom has there existed such mutuality of inspiration and sympathy as was wrought from the occasion, the orator, and the an dience. That there were a few in the andience who were not friendly to the orator, or at least estranged from him by the vicissitudes of polities, only added to the zest with which the student of passing events looked upon the distinguished gathering. I will not write of the oration itself; a verbatim copy will be within the reach of everyone, Great precautions we e taken by those in charge of the admission to the capital to insure not only the privileges of those who held tickets but to exclude the more numerous throng of pushing Americans who tried to worm themselves in. That these did not outwit the capitol police is extraordinary. This is no reflection supon the courage and tortitude of the guardians of the Capitol, but rather a tribute to the persistence and craftiness of the average Ameri--can citizen. When it is remembered that there are many more in Washington than the Capitol would hold. anxious to be present, as well as many invited and uninvited persons from other cities, the pressure for

This gentleman who has lately re turned from Oregon where he organized for building extensions of the Union Pacific lines whenever it may be desired, was in the city yesterday and was met by a Herald reporter. The General did not hesitate to express his belief that Puget will be ultimately the ontlet of all routes to the Pacific coast north of San Francisco. The route to Japan naturally starts from the coast at a point nearly as far north as Puget Sound and the current takes sailing vessels in that course, while steamships also find it the nearest route. The routes over which it has been organized to build in Oregon are two in number, both with Portland for an objective point. The southern route leaves the Union Pacific's Oregon main line at the junction of Malheur river with the Snake, on the eastern boundary of Oregon. It runs due west to the center of the State. From this point to the mouth of the Santiam river either one or two toutes is proposed through the Cascade range, the low er following the Willamette river and the upper the Santiam to Salem, from which point there is a single route laid out north to Portland The north-eastern route starts from Baker City, the terminus of the Oregon short line and runs to Umatilla, tollowing the Columbia west hence to Portland .- Omaba Herald.
