Fire at Junction.

At about 4 o'clock on Thursday morning of last week the four mill buildings owned by Kratz, Washburn & Howard, caught fire, and were totally destroyed by 6 o'clock. It is supposed the fire originated in the drying room near the top of the building. There were 20,000 bushels of wheat in the mill, 14,000 of which were owned by the mill company. The balance was owned by farmers. The mill and machinery is said to have been worth \$25,000, and insured for \$15,000. The wheat was also insured for \$7000.

A Primary Meeting of the Interfered.

The Democratic precinct convention for Corvallis precinct was held at the Court house last Saturday. It was called to order a little past one o'clock P. M. by W. S. McFadden. On motion of Mr. E. Miller, Col. Jas. Kinney was chosen Chairman of the meeting. On motion of John W. Moore which received a second by W. S. McFadden, F. A. Miller was chosen to act as Secretary. Mr. W. S. McFadden moved that Lewis Williams act as assistant Secretary, was defeated, whereupon Mr. McFadden moved that W. S. McFadden act as assistant Secretary which was carried. Mr. W. S. McFadden then offered a resolution to the effect that all persons who intended to support the Democratic ticket in the coming campaign and election are invited to take part in the primary meeting, which resolution was unanimously adopted. The chairman then stated the object of the meeting to be for the purpose of electing 13 delegates to attend the Democratic convention. It was moved by J. M. Osborne and carried to the effect that those persons receiving the highest number of votes be declared elected. After this a number of persons, some of whom were present and several of them being absent, were placed in nomination to be voted for a delegate. In response to an invitation to deposit their ballots in the provisional ball box a number of gentlemen responded to the invitation after which the vote was counted and the following named 13 persons were declared elected as delegates:

CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

March Term, 1882.

MONDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the county of Benton convened on last Monday, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon. The panel for jurors was returned into court and the following persons answered to their names:

Jacob Henkle Jr., James O. Writsmann, Jacob Frantz, Peter Gellatly, James Robinson, Thos. H. Powers, C. E. Moore, D. R. Hodges, Wiley Winkle, Joseph Hiseker, Joseph Connor, J. P. Alford, James M. Cross, Adam Wilhelm, A. N. Locke, S. R. Hawley, R. C. Kiger, Thomas Hayden, Edward Walden, W. E. Bohannon, John B. Goodman, J. M. Townsend, R. G. Simmons, James Martin, Z. H. Davis, J. S. S. Powell and Christian Voss Mr. Voss was excused, whereupon W. E. Bohannon, C. E. Moore, Joseph Connor, James Robinson, Wiley Winkle, James Cross and D. R. Hodges were drawn as Grand Jurors. C. E. Moore was appointed by the court as foreman of the Grand Jury. C. P. Blair, Eli S. King and W. P. Butterfield were appointed to act as bailiffs for this term of court. The case of Maria Armstrong vs. Sol King was continued. Amelia L. Zeroff Ex. vs. W. E. Eugene Weidman having been settled it was ordered dismissed at plaintiff's costs.

James Hoffman vs. S. H. Oliver was continued for service. Max Friendly vs. W. S. McCullough by consent was continued. John S. Baker vs. A. D. Stratford was continued to take depositions until the 1st day of the next regular term of this court.

Oscar Lecky vs. M. R. Payley, was continued until next regular term of court. F. B. Dunn vs. Wm. H. Hoffman and Mary E. Hoffman was continued to next term of court to take depositions. Jacob Hammar and Hannah Hammar vs. Nathaniel Markham and Thomas Markham continued for service.

J. A. B. meet vs. William Bennett referred to J. J. Whitney to take testimony and report the law and facts at this term of court.

James A. Yantis vs. S. H. Oliver was continued for service, the defendant having taken a walk in advance of the Sheriff. A. J. Williams vs. Jacob Hoag's judgment by default was taken in favor of plaintiff for \$159.87 and costs. Jovs Baragas vs. J. R. Crabtree and J. D. Glas, time for filing transcript extended until Wednesday.

Peter Cellary a jurymen was excused from serving. H. C. Lewis vs. A. Humphrey Sheriff sale of real estate confirmed. Deacon Smith vs. Henry Weaver et al Sheriff's sale of real estate confirmed. School Commissioners vs. W. S. McCullough et al Sheriff's sale of real estate confirmed.

TUESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

In the case of T. J. Creighton vs. J. T. Vincent and H. W. Vincent leave was granted to file an amended complaint. Alvin Miller vs. Albert Ullery and George Ullery and W. T. Osburn decree for foreclosure of mortgage for the sum of \$283.32 and sale of mortgaged premises. C. E. Washington vs. G. H. Washington for divorce default of defendant and referred to M. L. Nofziger to take testimony and report the law and facts. Sarah Arnold vs. William Arnold for divorce referred to S. T. Jeffries to take testimony and report law and facts to the court. James Y. Eustace vs. D. M. Hastings and J. M. Bowers continued to next term of court. The Grand Jury returned into court an indictment against Eliza Sanders and Lelan Sanders for the crime of larceny by stealing a steer. Bail was fixed by the court at \$500. Defendants were afterwards both arraigned and took their day to plead. Sol King vs. G. H. Euckinham was tried before a jury which returned into court a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for three goats or in case they are not returned, then for the sum of \$35. The jury returned into court two indictments charging Daniel Hastings and J. M. Bowers with maliciously injuring a dam and drawing water therefrom. Each of which indictments were indorsed "not a true bill" and the defendants were discharged. In the following cases to wit: Thos Cooper vs. W. A. Wells, M. Porter and Wm. Bogue vs. W. A. Wells, H. Bandy and Ed. Bandy vs. W. A. Wells and Adam Wilhelm vs. W. A. Wells, the defendant was permitted to withdraw demurrers and motions to complain in each of said cases and leave granted to file answers. The State of Oregon vs. J. Y. Eustace change of venue was granted to Linn Co. for trial. In the following cases, to wit: W. S. Walker vs. Isaac Belknap, F. A. Hornung vs. Oregon Pacific Railroad Company and Hamilton Job & Co. vs. Herbert Symons were all continued until next term of court. W. S. Walker vs. E. H. Bennett was dismissed at plaintiff's cost, the case having been settled. J. A. Payton vs. J. C. Boyd et al decree for foreclosure of mortgages. James Readman vs. George Armstrong was dismissed each party to pay their costs.

WEDNESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

In the case of Joe Burgess vs. J. R. Crabtree and J. D. Glas the motion of plaintiff to dismiss the appeal was denied. Mary Ellen Wiley vs. Wm. Froudford et al defendants confessed their demurrer and filed an answer. State of Oregon vs. Lelan Sanders and Eliza Sanders upon being called upon to plead each of said defendants plead not guilty whereupon a jury was impaneled and after trial of said cause the jury failed to agree.

Jacob Hammar and Hannah Hammar vs. Nathaniel Markham and Thomas Markham order by the court granted for leave to plaintiffs to serve summons by publication. George Robinson vs. J. L. Birdsell and R. E. Birdsell decree for \$205.05 and foreclosure on mortgage premises. School Commissioners vs. Paulina Wood referred to Mr. M. L. Nofziger to take testimony.

Niasha Blumberg vs. Jacob Blumberg ordered continued until next regular term. W. S. Walker vs. W. S. Hite continued to next regular term. M. A. Brown vs. W. S. Walker continued to next regular term. D. M. Hastings vs. J. Y. Eustace, Charles Sherbundy and James Southworth, injunctions to restrain defendants from interfering. A. A. Bennett vs. William Bennett decree dissolving marriage contract and name of plaintiff changed to A. A. Arnold, being her name before her marriage with defendant.

Presbytery of Oregon.

The Presbytery of Oregon, in connection with the Synod of Columbia, met on the 21st inst., in the Presbyterian church at Rossburg, and was opened with a sermon by the retiring Moderator, Rev. H. P. Dunning. The Presbytery was then called to order, and after the roll had been called and minutes of the last meeting read, Rev. J. N. Milligan, of Astoria, was elected Moderator for the ensuing ecclesiastical year and Elder Alther, of Salem, was chosen temporary clerk. Rev. E. N. Condit tendered his resignation as stated clerk which was accepted and Rev. J. N. Milligan elected to fill the vacancy, Rev. E. N. Condit being chosen acting stated clerk until the expiration of Mr. Milligan's term as Moderator.

Rev. H. P. Dunning, pastor of Corvallis church, tendered his resignation of his charge and asked Presbytery for a dissolution of the pastoral relation with said church. Commissioners on behalf of the church appeared and opposed, asked that the request of Mr. Dunning be not granted, and after considerable discussion it appearing to Presbytery for the best interests of the church that Mr. Dunning should remain its pastor, Presbytery refused by a vote of 13 to 5 to dissolve the pastoral relationship and Mr. Dunning's resignation was not accepted.

Besides the usual routine of business interesting reports were read from the various permanent committees. Rev. R. W. Hill, Synodical Missionary, was chosen commissioner to the General Assembly and Rev. H. P. Dunning Alternate.

Mr. Caldwell, a licentiate of the Presbytery of San Francisco, after the usual examination was solemnly ordained to the full office of the ministry, the Venerable E. R. Geary, D. D. of Eugene City, offering up the ordaining prayer, and Rev. R. W. Hill delivering the charge to the newly ordained brother. Presbytery closed its session on the evening of Thursday, March 23d, and adjourned to meet in the fall in the Presbyterian church at Tualatin Plains.
