Resolutions, beg leave to submit the follow-

The Republican party of Benton county, in convention assembled on this 8th day of April, 1882, hereby make the following declaration of principles :

1. That the laws regulating the assessment and collection of taxes should be so amended that all classes of property shall bear an equal proportion of the public barden; and that all sums evidenced by note and secur-ed by mortgage on real extite should be made taxable in the county where such real estate is situated.
2. That the Republican party deeply re-

grets and strongly deprecates the acti President Arthur in votoing the bill for restricting Chinese immigration lately passed by both Houses of Congress, and asserts the right of the American nation to prevent the incursion of hordes of Asiatics, whose cheap labor may improperly depress the wages earned by American citizens in many departments of life.

3. 

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
