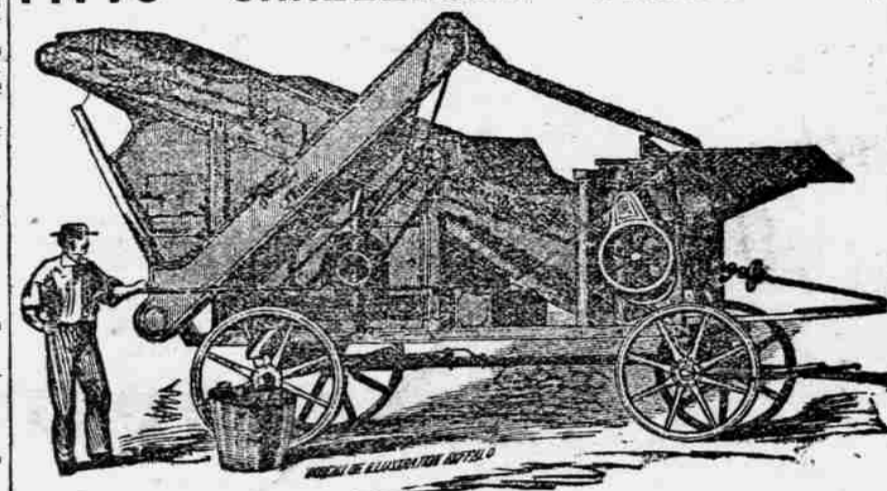

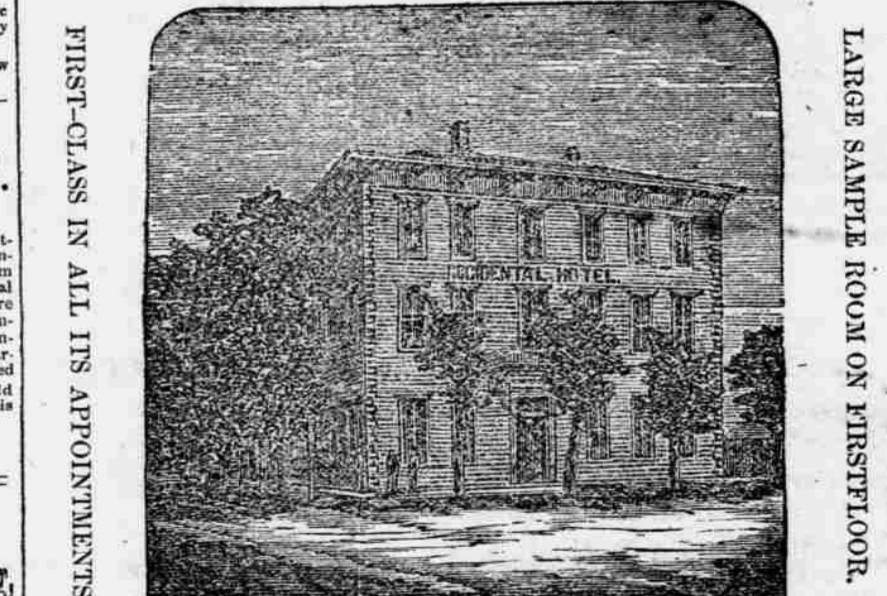

The turbulent scenes of last week in Congress have been continued through the present week, and the end is not yet, nor will be until a Republican is placed in every contested seat.
