LEARN ABOUT THE PULSE.

Every person should know how to ascertain the state of the pulse in health; then, by comparing it when he is ailing, he may have some idea of the urgency of his case. Parents should know the health pulse of each child, as now and then a person is born with a peculiarly slow or fast pulse, and the very case in hand may be of that peculiarity. An infant's pulse is 140; a child of 7 about 80. and from 20 to 60 years is 70 beats a minute; declining to 60 at four score. A healthy grown person's pulse beats 70 times a minute. There may be good health down to 60, but if the pulse always exceeds 70 there is a disease, the machine is working itself out; there is a fever or inflamation somewhere; and the body is feeding on itself; as in consumption, when the pulse is quick, that is over 70, grad. ually increasing, with decreased Chances of cure, until it reaches 110 to 120, when death comes before many days When the pulse is over 70 for months, and there is a slight cough, the lungs are affected. There are, however, peculiar constitutions in health.

The Mountain Road.

Jason Wheeler returned from the "bunch grass country" last Monday, coming over the mountains on the Lebanon road, says the Albany memocrat.
