### THE HOUSEHOLD.

**WEE PUDDING.**—Quarter of a pound of butter, 1/4 of a pound of sugar, 2 eggs, rind of a lemon; beat for 20 minutes; half fill teacups and bake 20 minutes.

**CRULLERS.**—Three eggs, 3 table-spoonfuls melted butter, 6 table-spoonfuls sugar, a piece of soda, the size of a pea; mix soft with flour; cut and fry in hot lard.

**TEA CAKE.**—Bake 2 eggs in a cup; fill this with thick cream; add 1 cup of sugar, 1 teaspoonful cream of tartar, 1/2 teaspoonful soda, 1/2 cup of flour; flavor to taste.

**BROWN BREAD.**—One cup of sour milk, 2 cups sweet milk, 3 cups corn meal, 1 cup flour, 1/2 cup molasses, 2 teaspoonfuls soda; steam 2 hours and bake half an hour.

**WESTERN COOKIES.**—One cup sour milk, 1 cup powdered sugar, a little salt, 1 teaspoonful of soda; mix as soft as possible; roll thin; sprinkle with sugar; slightly roll out and bake in a quick oven.

**POTATO CAKES.**—Roast some potatoes in the oven. When done skin and pound in a mortar, with a small piece of butter warmed in a little milk. Chop a shallot and a little parsley very finely, add pepper and salt; shape into cakes; egg and bread them, crumb them and fry a light brown.

**HOMINY MUFFINS.**—Two cups boiled hominy beat it smooth, stir in three cups sour milk, half cup melted butter, two teaspoonfuls salt, two tablespoonfuls of sugar; add three eggs well beaten; one teaspoon of soda, dissolved in hot water; two cups of flour. Bake quickly.

**TOMATO SOUP.**—Three pounds of beef one quart canned tomatoes, one gallon water. Let the meat and water boil for two hours, or until the liquid is reduced to a little more than two quarts. Then stir in the tomatoes, and stew all slowly for three quarters of an hour longer. Season to taste, strain and serve.

**SWEET PICKLES.**—Cook the fruit in water until a straw will go easily through it and when cool place in a jar with a few cloves stuck in each. To each seven pounds of fruit, take three pounds of sugar, one quart of vinegar, four ounces of cinnamon and two ounces of cloves. Boil the vinegar and spices together for a few minutes and pour over the fruit. Repeat the boiling for five days in succession and put away for use.

**FRUIT PIES.**—Even the best of cooks know that it oftentimes is impossible to prevent the juice of the fruit from soaking into the under-crust, making the pie "soggy" and unwholesome. Brushing the crust with a white of an egg is said to be efficacious, but Mrs. Ewing tells of a way that, we think, would be excellent. It is to lay a clean folded cloth or napkin on the under crust in the center of the dish, and lay the upper crust lightly over it, wetting the edges to prevent their sticking together, then bake. Prepare the fruit—berries, peaches or apples by stewing and seasoning to taste. Take off the top crust while hot, pour in the fruit, replace the crust, sprinkle sugar over it and let it stand to cool together. We think this must be very nice, and a complete cure for heavy indigestible pie crust. *Farmer's Review*

**Keep Horses Fat.**  
It is not good policy to let work horses get thin. It costs more to put on flesh than it does to keep it on. Flesh that becomes hardened by exercise will be kept up with less food; under the same work, than it took to put it on. From 15 to 30 pounds of food will about supply the daily consumption of horses, large and small. The English cavalry horses are fed 10 quarts of oats and 12 pounds of hay three times a day. The American cavalry horses have had the English rations increased to 13 or 14 quarts of oats and an equal amount of hay three times a day. The hunter, in the season, is allowed from 16 to 18 quarts of oats, and about eight pounds of hay, fed five times a day. The race horse is allowed from 15 to 20 quarts per day, and nearly as much hay as the hunter being usually fed five times a day.

It is a noteworthy fact that sheep in British markets are selling higher than cattle. This certainly does not correspond with the order of things on this side of the water. The condition of the foreign markets does not effect us much, however, owing to the small proportions of our sheep that are suitable for exportation.

### EDUCATIONAL NOTES.

At a recent meeting of the Maryland Teachers' Association the abolition of corporal punishment in school are generally advocated.

More than 250 of the young women at Wellesley College study Chemistry. The College expects to instruct about 500 students next year.

The colored children in the public schools are said to be nearly free from myopia, a trouble which is daily increasing among the white pupils.

It is complained of the public schools of Philadelphia that their teaching is narrow and antiquated. Memory is cultivated at the expense of every other faculty.

The city of Fort Worth, Texas, has voted to tax herself for the maintenance of six free schools for ten months in the year. The city has 12,000 inhabitants.

The sessions of the Baltimore Medical College—an institution that instructs students of both sexes—have been extended to seven and a half instead of five months.

The Cincinnati Wesleyan College has been purchased by its own authorities, money having been raised by them and by the Alumnae Association for the purpose.

In the schools of Weimar, Germany, there is an excellent custom of taking all the pupils once a week under different teachers on an excursion of out-door study and observation.

A Committee of the Massachusetts Society for the University Education of Women are endeavoring to establish in Boston a loan library for the use of students who are in need of such help.

The colored children of Georgia are said to be as eager for education as the white children and in many cases more so. In a great many places they are more regular in attendance than are the whites.

No text books in arithmetic or geography are put into the hands of pupils during their first three years in the primary schools of New Haven. The oral method is chiefly used. The result is said to be encouraging.

It is far better to start with two superior animals, and build up the herd slowly, than to purchase largely of inferior animals because they are cheap, and expect to breed them into "shape." The only excuse for a great outlay is for the purchase of a well bred sire.

The Union Pacific Railroad Company has obliged all coal dealers on its line in Nebraska to lay in at least one hundred tons of bituminous before September 1st, so that there need be no suffering from cold in case next winter is like its immediate predecessor.

Spruce butter tubs are the best, white hemlock makes a sweet tub, and injures its appearance; white ash gives the butter a strong flavor if kept long and increases the liability to mold; maple smells and cracks badly. Soak all tubs four to six days in brine before using.

In the examination of applicants for citizenship before the Court, Judge Green asked one of them, who was a Frenchman, "Who makes the laws here?" The reply was: "Ze Shudge." The lawyers smiled.
