There again they get little satisfaction beyond a courteous recognition. The new administration intends to go slowly, and i the army of rapacious spoils-hunters would take the hints already thrown out by the President, it would sound a retreat while it has money enough to get home. It is pretty well understood now that only a few neves sary appointments wi'l be made at present. When the importunate office hunters have gone home, the places to be filled will be gone over, and the men selected for then will not be from among those who charged upon the President upon his first appear

The majority of the democratic congres men are still in the city and will be passing back and forth from their homes during the entire recess of Congress. They too are lingering to see just what they are going to get out of their party success. They have left the Capitol building and are now as sembled in the hotel lobbies and about the White House. Their lack of encourage ment in their efforts to assist the new administration in making changes and appointments has provoked come grunbling and caused many to inquire if New York is going to run the govern neut. 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
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
