Dispatches received here vesterday moreing from Albany announce meager particulars of a murder in Albany, wherein U.o. Campbell, of that place, met his death at the hands of W. W. Saunders, of this place formerly editor of the Benton Leader. Saun ders left Corvallis Tuesday for Albany, informing a friend that he had just heard from Albany and that he had something to at tend to there. Wednesday evening about 7:40 o'clock he met Campbell walking on the street with Miss Mattie Allison, when Saunders shot Campbell, the shot taking ef fect and his victim fell from the sidewalk. when Saunders shot the second time, but without effect. Campbell died the next morning at 6 o'clock from the effect of the shot. The assault was entirely without provocation, the dispatches so state Same ders was arrested a few minutes after, and at the time of going to press, his pre imina ry examination was not concluded. It is reported that Saun lets was to be married in a few weeks to a sister of the young lady with whom Campbell was walking at the time of the shoo i .g.
