A Washington dispatch of the 16th inst. says: Moderate democrats, who fear the effects of free trade agitation in the house this winter, are quietly devising a scheme which will rush the silver question upon consideration of that body at an early stage of the session, before the ways and means committee shall have time to prepare and report a tariff bill. If this plan succeeds, they hope the tariff question will assume a secondary place, and by the time the silver business is disposed of other matters will press for consideration, to the exclusion of any effort at tariff revision It is hardly probable that the free trade democrats, who are almost solidly opposed to any change in the silver coinage law, and who are fierce for "tariff reform," will consent to any such programme.

The N. Y. Tribune says of the free trade convention at Chicago: "It is plain the free traders mean to make war this winter. it is also plain that like men of sense, they are beginning now to prepare public opinion for the elections next year, and they are to be repulsed not without some effort. The defenders of protection may as well begin their defense. Thirteen state organizations were reported to the convention, with local organizations in other States. It is also well not to underrate their zeal or influence. Their first step is announced to raise a fund of \$20,000, which is needed this and next year in view of congression d elections 1886. This application of funds will be remembered when free trade candidates present themselves next year. A third of the sum is already pledged. 
