ANOTHER CABINET PANEL.

A new cabinet department has been created by congress—that of the "department of agriculture." The president has approved the bill creating this office and has named Norman J. Colman, of Missouri, as the one to act as secretary of that office, and the senate has confirmed him. This will make the eighth member to constitute a president's cabinet and President-elect Harrison will have the honor of naming the first one to hold this position for a regular four years' term. Mr. Colman will, no doubt, go out of office on Monday, March 4th, next.

The establishment of the new department seems to have been rather in response to a sentiment than to fill an actual want in the machinery of government. It is a compliment to the farmers. The former bureau of agriculture under the department of the interior has filled all actual needs, and indeed the elevation of its head to a cabinet rank was not regarded with favor by preceding commissioners or by the present incumbent, who will pass into history as the first to enjoy its honors. But a sentiment was widespread in the country that so important an element as the agricultural industry should be represented in the president's council by an officer of equal rank with others composing it. The only actual effect will be to increase the cost of maintaining the department and add to its political importance.

This is the first addition to the cabinet since 1849, when the department of the interior was established. The original cabinet was composed of the secretaries of state, war and the treasury, with the attorney-general. The acts creating these positions were dated: secretary of war, August 7, 1789; secretary of the treasury, September 2, 1789; secretary of state, September 15, 1789; attorney-general, September 24, 1789. An act temporarily establishing the postoffice department was also passed September 22, 1789, but it was not until May 8, 1794, that it was made a permanent creation. Even then the postmaster-general was not a cabinet official. He was supposed to be a subordinate of the treasury department. President Jackson in 1829 invited the then incumbent to attend cabinet meeting, and since that date the postmaster-general has been by custom a member of the cabinet.

The navy department was created April 30, 1798. Prior to that time the naval branch of the military service was under the secretary of war. The first secretary of the navy was George Cabot of Massachusetts. After that there was no additions to the cabinet until the interior department was established, with Thomas Ewing of Ohio as the first secretary.

NEW OFFICIALS.

The legislature has under Dawson's new railroad commission bill that passed both houses and then repassed over the governor's veto, elected J. P. Far of Baker, Geo. W. Colvig, of Douglas, and Robt. Clow, of P. K. (formerly superintendent of the penitentiary), to be the commissioners, and recommended that they appoint George Waggoner, former commissioner, as clerk of the board. The salaries of the board each is \$2,500 and \$2,000 to the clerk annually.

For fish commissioners—E. P. Thompson, F. C. Reed, and Campbell.

Pilot commissioners—Captain L. Wilson, Captain J. A. Brown, and A. Montgomery, \$2,000 annually.

Food commissioner—Professor R. K. Warren, of Portland, \$1,200 a year.

Librarian—J. B. Putnam, \$1,000 a year.

Boatman—Wm. Dench, \$500 yearly.

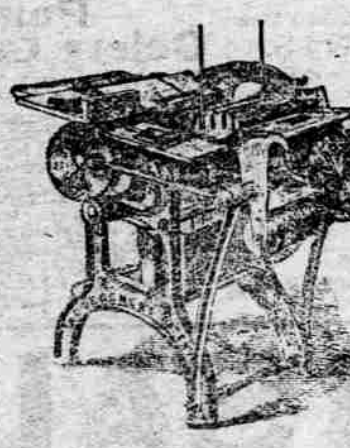
