WEST YACQUINA.—A syndicate composed of Wallis Nash, Dr. G. R. Farra, and C. H. Lee, of Corvallis, J. S. Cooper, of Independence, R. S. Strahan, A. Hackleman, E. W. Langdon, L. E. Blain, J. W. Cusick, C. J. Stewart and Curran & Monteith, of Albany, have purchased the entire town plat of West Yacquina, situated opposite the docks at Yacquina City. The price paid for the same was fifteen thousand dollars. It embraces one thousand lots and an undivided half interest in seventy-five acres now owned jointly by this syndicate and the Oregon Development company. They propose to place the lots upon the market this summer. Some of the men in this syndicate are in a position to know the future movements of the Oregon Pacific Railroad company, and this purchase, in connection with the Oregon Development company, may be taken as an indication of the early resumption of work toward the completion of this road to its eastern connection.

MALICIOUS CONDUCT.—A complaint has been filed by B. T. George, of this county, against three of the Dow boys and James Thompson, who live near Monroe, for disorderly conduct, etc. It seems that on Sunday, March 17th, the defendants were in Monroe and became very full of bug juice, and while on their road home stopped and made a raid on Mr. George's barn, by turning things upside down generally, drinking a lot of cider that was there, and ending up by firing off pistols. Mr. George was away at the time, and his wife and children were pretty badly frightened. Deputy Sheriff St. Clair went after these fellows on Tuesday with warrants for their arrest, but they had skipped out, so he says, as no one could tell where they were. They may yet find it was a costly jollification for St. Patrick's day.

ONE VAG.—A good specimen of the vagrant order was pulled by Marshal Dunn on Tuesday evening, and on Wednesday was taken before Recorder St. Clair. He said his name was John Jackson, that he was no vag; he had an occupation, called "whittling." It seems that he is pretty handy with the knife and whittles trinkets out of wood and begs for his meals giving these in return. He is a healthy looking tramp weighing about 180 pounds, so the recorder gave him his liberty providing he immediately leave town. He started and has probably struck some other city jail by this time. Corvallis is poor place for tramps, especially "whittlers."

DEGREE OF B. P.—The Millersburg, Pa., Sentinel, of March, 22nd, says: "Rev. W. C. Kanter, pastor of the Evangelical church of this place, who for several years has been pursuing a special course of study under the direction of a noted institution in Chicago, Ill., received a diploma this week, conferring upon him the degree of Bachelor of Philosophy." A SOAP FACTORY.—Preparations are being made by an Oregon City manufacturing company to manufacture soap on a large scale. A kettle has been procured of a capacity sufficient to hold thirty thousand pounds of soap a week, and in addition twenty thousand pounds a week will be made by the cold process. The sample boxes made by the presiding chemist have brought numerous orders, one Portland firm alone having ordered five thousand boxes. About eight men will be employed in the soap factory.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH MATTERS.—A meeting of the guild of the Episcopal church was held in Corvallis on Monday and a new vestry elected and given charge of the work of arranging and erecting the new church building on the grounds lately purchased on Jefferson and seventh street. The present parsonage will be moved there shortly and arrangements are endeavoring to be perfected whereby the old building of the church can be sold. When completed the new edifice will be very handsome.

After discussing on the matter they concluded to buy five acres from Prof. Arnold, 110 acres from G. R. Farra, and twenty-five acres from Jos.
