A GOOD SCORE.—The editor of the GAZETTE was agreeably surprised on assuming duties on Wednesday morning by finding a fine lot of snipe laying on his table, compliments of C. A. Lord, Zeph Job and E. L. Bier. The snipe were trophies of a hunt Tuesday, near T. B. Smith's place, south of Corvallis. One hundred and sixty snipe were killed in all, the score standing for each as follows: 52, 53, and 55. This is the largest haul and most evenly divided score that any trio of hunters have made yet in this vicinity.

DEATH OF J. W. MAGUIRE.—Just as we go to press the sad news of the death of J. W. Maguire, at Jefferson, Marion County, is received. Mr. Maguire was well known in Corvallis and held a position in the Oregon Pacific office for several years, but last Summer he was compelled to give up his place on account of poor health, and on Monday last he accompanied Mr. Brink to his home in Jefferson in hopes that the change would do him good, but was taken worse and died Wednesday night. His parents live in the East.

RUN OVER.—One day last week Mr. Howell, who lives near Harton's Mills, about five miles southwest of Monroe, came to Corvallis to transact some business and started home in the evening, and while passing H. C. Gregg's place, eight miles this side of Monroe his horses became frightened and ran away. Mr. Howell was pitched over the dash-board of the wagon and one of the wheels of the wagon passed over his leg breaking it. He was picked up and carried to Mr. Gregg's and a doctor was called who set the broken limb.

TWO TRAINS DAILY.—Travel between Portland and San Francisco overland has increased so much that one train per day each way is no longer sufficient to accommodate it. It is stated on good authority that the Southern Pacific company will between now and the 1st of May put on two trains daily each way, one starting in the morning and the other in the evening from each end. This will be a great accommodation to the traveling public, and the change will be hailed with delight by the people along the road.—Oregonian.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH.—At a meeting of the Episcopal congregation, of Corvallis, Messrs. Wallis Nash, B. L. Arnold, J. D. Letcher, Dr. W. Graham, W. E. Doane, Jno. Ray and Jos. D. Johnson were elected as vestry, to take charge of the temporal affairs of the parish and were instructed to remove the rectory and outbuildings to, and build a new church building upon, their lots at the corner of Jefferson and Seventh streets. At a meeting of the vestry, Dr. Graham and Wallis Nash were elected wardens of the church and Prof. Letcher, secretary and treasurer. Messrs. Wallis Nash, John Ray, and W. E. Doane were appointed the building committee, and Mr. W. E. Doane, architect. The contract for the new church building was let to Messrs. Brooker and Burrows, they being the lowest bidders, and they have already commenced tearing down the old building, and will commence at once upon the foundation of the new one. Arrangements have been made for the congregation to worship in the reading-room every Sunday morning until the completion of this new church. The contractors are now engaged in moving the other buildings to their new site, in order to give the school trustees clear possession of the ground by May 15. The plan for the new church which is to be a very handsome and churchly building, was prepared by Messrs. J. B. Walker and W. E. Doane and reflects credit upon these gentlemen's taste and ability.

THE COLLEGE.—President Arnold by invitation will attend the Teachers' Institute at Eugene next Saturday, and before returning will run over to Roseburg to arrange for the Farmers' Institute, which will be held there about the middle of May. Prof. Lake has just returned from a meeting of the State Horticultural Society at Portland. Prof. Hull spent last Friday evening and Saturday at the Teachers' Institute in Albany and took part in the proceedings. The last term of this session commenced last week. The students are doing good work in the class room and spend an hour or more each evening in practical work upon the farm and grounds. Judging from the sign boards, Prof. Ginn must be experimenting upon the different varieties of potatoes, grasses, peas, beets, etc., while Prof. Lake and his experienced assistant George Caste, are not neglecting the Horticultural Department. Hon. J. K. Weatherford, of the Ex. Comm., spent a few days in town this week on college business.
