A LITTLE JAR.—Between 12 and 1 o'clock on last Saturday the atmosphere in the region of the southwest corner of Monroe and Water streets, besides being filled with the terrible stench that usually arises thereabouts, was blue with the cussings and mad movements of one W. H. Mathews, who was in the act of pummeling his wife, for some little occurrence that she had caused which was contrary to his wishes. After he had finished his beastly work, she proceeded to the recorder's office and swore out a warrant for his arrest. Accordingly he was taken before Recorder St. Clair and after a trial was fined \$25 and costs or twelve days in the city jail. He chose the jail part and was placed therein. Monday his wife packed up her half of the household goods and skipped out. Mathews hearing of this concluded he would not languish any longer in durance vile, forked over the \$25 and was released. He is now, very likely, pondering over the great question: Does it pay to maul your wife, or is marriage a failure?

THE N. M. COMPANY.—The Northwest Mining company held a meeting in the old courthouse on last Saturday afternoon. An organization was affected, by-laws were adopted, and a board of directors was elected, consisting of John Ray, J. D. Johnson, J. W. Ryburn, Thos. Cooper, Z. H. Davis, Punderson Avery, Lewis Wilson, J. A. Cuthbert, and F. M. Johnson. One thousand dollars' worth of stock have already been taken, in shares of \$10 each. This is the company incorporated for the purpose of mining for coal, coal gas, coal oil, etc., on the Wyatt farm two miles west of this city. The board was given power to go ahead and elect a president, secretary and treasurer, which they did at a meeting on Wednesday night.

MAKING ARRANGEMENTS.—The legal fraternity of Corvallis, together with others, are making arrangements to dedicate the new courthouse building on or about the 4th of July. If possible let all, who can, assist in making this a grand affair. Last year Corvallis merited the praise of all in her celebrities for the 4th, and this time it can go still further because of the occasion mentioned above. It is not necessary that the same military exercises be carried out that were had in '88, but by having the different orders, the firemen, etc., join hands and all pull together there will be no doubt but what there can be a regular howling old time made of the day.

UNCHANGED.—The condition of Rev. J. W. Harris, of Salem, and formerly of Corvallis, continues virtually unchanged, save that he is growing weaker from day to day. It is now thirty-one days since he has partaken of food, and then he ate but two ounces of some light diet. Until two weeks ago, he took a little coffee each day, but since that time his only sustenance has been warm water. He is conscious of his condition, and realizes that as the days succeed each other, his end is approaching. He was stricken down with paralysis quite a time ago.

HAS ARRIVED.—The dynamo and machinery for L. L. Hurd's electric light works arrived on Monday last and was taken to the room where it will be placed in position. The main wire is all stretched and at present the workmen are busy wiring the different business houses which are to be lighted by this system. Hurd expects that he can furnish light in about a week or ten days.

SOLD.—The four lots and house, belonging to the estate of S. Meeklin, deceased, situated in the block just west of the new school grounds, was sold on Saturday at administrators sale to J. T. Phillips, the blacksmith, for \$425. Hal C. Lyon was the administrator.

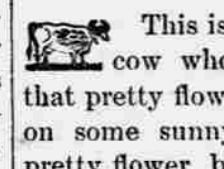
He Bobs Up from Below with a Few Illustrations on the Cow Question.



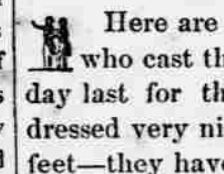
This is the female cow of Corvallis after he has heard the result of the canvass at the city election on Monday last. He is nice isn't he? Oh, my.



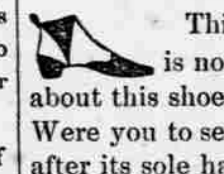
Here is the pretty flower, that tries to bloom in the spring, tra la, in your front yard on which you have spent hours of labor to make it grow.



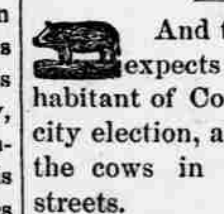
This is the darling little cow who has her eye on that pretty flower, and who will, on some sunny morn, get that pretty flower between her teeth. Good-bye, flower.

According to the canvass of votes of the city election held on Monday last, there were 171 votes in favor of the cows running at large in the city limits and 130 against them, thus giving a majority of forty-one for the cows and sanctioning the idea that Corvallis is a better looking cow pasture than she is a city. There were some who voted "yes" who supposed they were voting "no" to the question and vice versa—looks as though bug-juice was prevalent. Well, each and every one must submit to the majority and stand from under; and there is some talk of booming the town now by creating "salt-licks" at the corners of some of the principal streets. Then again, if the cows must run at large, the office of "walk-cleaner" should be created and an energetic person appointed to fill the position.

The officers elected to carry on the town government for the ensuing year are: Mayor—J. B. Lee, 242 votes; F. M. Johnson, 51. Recorder—John Porter, 187; Wm. Holgate, 110. Marshal—James Dunn, 190; D. A. Osborn, 109. Treasurer—E. B. Bier,

176; A. H. Campbell, 127. Councilmen—First ward, Z. H. Davis, 93 votes; second ward, A. F. Hershner, 69, J. C. Taylor, 75, A. Emerick, 25; third ward, M. S. Neugass, 84.

Even Roseburg is getting worked up over the cow question. The following is from the review of that city:

"The city council should submit at the next election to the voters of this incorporation, cows or no cows, which! Don't kill the cows, the pretty cows, that play about your doors. No, invite them in and give them food, and thus preserve your good manners. You will see the streets of Corvallis greatly improved by not allowing the cows to run at large. And see that you cast your vote on Monday next by saying that they must go.—CORVALLIS GAZETTE. Let our city fathers pass an ordinance to prohibit cows running at large on the streets of Roseburg and they will receive the everlasting thanks of our farmers, whose wagons and contents are sometimes almost destroyed by the greatest of all nuisances, the town cow."

Last Wednesday morning at about 7 o'clock this reporter saw thirteen cows running on the streets in the vicinity of the new court house—two had bells on. If there were that many at that hour how many would there be at 9!

Were there no cows running at large in the city limits there would be no need of a fence around the court house block; and some of the fences around the different residences in this city could be done away with.

It has not been learned yet whether or not a cow will be thrown in with a lot in Corvallis should you purchase one more. There is no doubt but that that the cow will do all she can to get into the lot.

THE STATE GRANGE MEETING.—The Salem grange is making preparations for the state grange on the 28th. The meeting will be held in the state house and an interesting time is anticipated. The delegates are expected to be loaded for the occasion and important matters of the grange and to farmers are to be discussed, says the Salem Journal.

The master says: "It is well known to the people of the state that we, the agriculturists, are capable of attending to affairs pertaining to our interests, and that we demand representation and are going to see that we are represented in the councils to the state and nation in a ratio commensurate with the interests we represent."

THE NEW SCHOOL BUILDING.—Geo. Marshal, of Portland, is now busy drawing up the plans and specifications for the new school house which is soon to be erected here. He expects to have it ready so that bids can be advertised for some time next week. The structure will be two-story with a brick basement, will contain eight large rooms, the smallest being 28x32, have two large halls, and an east, west and north entrance, with two flights of stairs nicely arranged to prevent all accidents in case of fire or any other confusion.

THE EVANGELICAL CONFERENCE.

[The first day's session was reported in last week's issue of the GAZETTE.]

The second day's session of the Evangelical conference was held on Friday, with Bishop Escher in the chair.

After devotional exercises the committee on boundaries reported. Many changes were necessary in order to supply the increasing demands of the work. Among others, the following changes were made: Corvallis was made a station; two missions were made out of Lewisville mission, by adding Mission Bottom and Brooks to Dayton mission. Dayton was made a circuit; Portland was made a station; LaCamas and St. John were cut off from Albina mission and made into a new one. Albina and North Portland is to constitute a new mission. Several new missions were also formed in Washington territory.

The committee on state of missions reported all enjoying a more or less reasonable degree of prosperity.

The following were in attendance: J. Bowersox, C. C. Poling, L. B. Fisher, P. Bittner, H. Schuknecht, J. M. Dick, H. L. Pratt, J. M. Beauchamp, S. N. Ploverman, H. I. Bittner, L. S. Fisher, A. R. Johnson, J. L. Hershner, Thos. Yost, James A. Ray, F. S. Locke, E. S. Bollinger.

The church extension committee held a meeting also, showing during the year nearly \$150 raised toward this purpose.

I. B. Fisher preached an excellent sermon in the evening.

The third and last day's session was held on Saturday with Bishop Escher in the chair.

F. S. Locke was received into the itinerancy.

The statistical committee's report showed an advance all along the line.

The financial committee indicated that pastors received a reasonable support.

The committee on Sabbath and temperance reported very strong resolutions against Sabbath desecration. The following is the resolution on temperance, which was unanimously passed:

"Resolved, That we will endeavor

by all fair and available methods, to secure statutory provisions declaring it a misdemeanor to either drink or furnish to others, intoxicating beverages in any way whatever."

Bittner; Rockford, to be supplied.

After an earnest prayer by Rev. J. Bowersox the conference adjourned to meet at Albany next year.

The Sunday services of the different churches consisted of a union service at the Southern Methodist chapel with a sermon by Bishop Escher. In the evening Rev. Bollinger preached at the Congregational church and Rev. Dick at the Presbyterian.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

PORTLAND, OR., May 3. The fourth annual convention of the Oregon State Sunday School Association will be held in the Presbyterian church, Corvallis, commencing at 2 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday, June 4th, and closing at 12 m. on Thursday, June 6, 1889. While this is a mass convention, and all interested in the work are most earnestly and cordially invited to be present, yet to insure representation, all Sunday schools in the state are requested to select two or more persons pledged to attend. Word comes to us from Corvallis that the friends of the work in that city will open their homes and hearts and take care of all who may attend the convention. That they may know who are to be entertained, all those expecting to be present will confer a favor by sending their names to Prof. W. E. Yates, Corvallis, that places may be assigned them. Arrangements have been made with the lines of the Southern Pacific railroad in Oregon and the Oregon Pacific railroad to return at one-fifth fare all those in attendance who have paid full fare in going to the convention over these lines. Prof. Henry Sheak, of Philomath, Oregon, is the statistical secretary of the association, and he desires to secure a report from every Sunday school in Oregon. RICH MINE DISCOVERY.

Charles Hayes, who lives up on Cow creek in Lane county has made a rich discovery of gold mines up on the Cow creek. These mines promise to yield in paying quantities. He first discovered this mine in 1862, but was not aware of the paying qualities and returned to Colorado where he remained till this spring, when a feeling came over him of again returning to the claim that he had discovered in the spring of 1862, says the Salem Journal. The ore he claims to be 85 per cent silver and also has found rich gold veins within two and one-half miles of the above valuable discovery.

He has at present about twenty-eight tons of ore on the dump and has reached a depth of thirty-eight feet in the shaft up to the present. There is plenty of wood and water handy and everything convenient for mining purposes. A good wagon road leads to the railroad which is eighteen miles from the claim.
