THE FOURTH ONE.

Another smashup occurred on the east side O. & C. on Friday night last about 10 o'clock. It was caused by a switch being out of order. The tender of the locomotive, and three cars were derailed. The fireman was terribly bruised and has since died. The engineer escaped unhurt. S. H. Friendly, of Eugene, was on the wrecked train and his berth was the first one in the front end of the wrecked sleeper. His escape from a horrible death was a narrow one. Just before the wreck occurred he ordered the porter to arrange his bed and while waiting he thought he would step into the next car behind and smoke while he waited. Just as he reached the other car and before the porter had commenced to arrange the bed, a terrific shock was felt and the train came to a stand still. Rushing to the platform nothing but escaping smoke and steam could be seen, but it was certain the train was off the track. The car in which Mr. Friendly had his berth had plunged into a freight car loaded with railway iron and the whole end of the car was torn to pieces.

His berth was a wreck. Had the accident happened a few moments later he perhaps would have been killed. H. Pape, of Corvallis, was also on the train on his way to Jacksonville to act the part as bridegroom in his own wedding. This is the fourth smashup to happen between Salem and Eugene since the 28th of July. The other three were, one at Albany in which by a misplaced switch Engineer "Big Jack" and Fireman Guthrie met death; another near Turner caused by a flock of sheep; and the Halsey wreck caused by cows obstructing the track, which resulted in the death of Fireman Wm. Ranson and the wounding of Engineer McFadden.

Oscar Tom, of Alsea, called at the GAZETTE office on Wednesday. He reports raising some very fine corn the past season, which yielded at the rate of ninety-five bushels per acre.
