One of the state tickets of the two great political parties in Oregon has been formed. The republicans are now ready for the work of the coming campaign; they have prepared a ticket and are in waiting on their opponents—the democrats—to do the same. The candidate for supreme judge is R. S. Bean, the present circuit judge of this district, and who is now engaged in this city in holding court for the spring term of this county. He is a young man of excellent qualities, an able and learned jurist, and will do honor to this high office. Rest assured, reader, that the republican banner this year will have "Victory" inscribed upon it.
