The best interests of Benton county are urged when some of the qualities possessed by C. E. Moor, for representative to the state legislature, are mentioned. He is a man who will be faithful to the interests of his locality. He has good judgment and ready intelligence, and has had many years of experience in public affairs. On matters relating to taxation, public appropriations, and legislation on financial questions, he is especially sagacious, and Oregon's greatest need to-day is legislators who can handle these questions with wisdom. Common "horse sense" is a necessary qualification for a legislator, no doubt; but experience and sagacity make that attribute more useful, and every citizen of the state who casts his ballot for a representative to the state legislature this year, will, in a greater or lesser degree, be affected by the result. There are some laws on the statute books of Oregon which need, and will receive, some attention in January, 1891, such as taxation of securities, etc., and the persons entrusted with this work ought to be able to give them an intelligent and comprehensive adjustment.

Prof. E. B. McElroy has demonstrated beyond question his qualifications for superintendent of public instruction. It may well be doubted if another state in the Union has a more efficient administration in this department of its government, than Oregon. Under Prof. McElroy's efficient supervision, the rising generation have the best of advantages, and his energy expended in the way of institutes for the comparison of views and methods has been a source of no little benefit to the teachers throughout the state. The people of Oregon cannot improve the condition of the public schools by a change.

The republican nominee for coroner, Dr. J. L. Akin is a citizen of Philomath and no words of this source can add to his popularity throughout the fields of his acquaintances. He is not only a man of absolute integrity but is also a careful and competent practitioner. He has had many years experience in medical business and is well qualified to perform the duties of coroner.

The chief executive of the state of Oregon ought to be a man for whom his fellow citizens have no occasion to blush. He should be a man of dignity and of good sense. A man for whom the press at large, the disinterested press, our critics from other states would find occasion more for praise than ridicule. If we elect for governor a man whose official acts call forth the sneer of contempt from our observant neighbors shall we not have ourselves to thank for the low estimate placed upon our intelligence by them. We want for our chief executive one who will, by the wisdom of his official attitude towards the public weal, promote the best interests of the commonwealth. The republican party has nominated such a man. In the Hon. D. P. Thompson, the people of Oregon find a man who is irreproachable in his character, dignified in his life and actions, and an Oregonian in the fullest sense of the word with all the patriotism, worth and intelligence which that implies. Mr. Thompson is a man of broad views. He is not a man to sacrifice the public good at the dictate of narrow prejudices. He is not a man to prostitute his official position for his private gain, or at the solicitation of his political friends. He has nothing of a private nature to gain by the elevation to the highest office within the gift of Oregonians. But there is a vein of patriotism, unsullied by sordid ambition, which runs through every true citizen within our state. Patriotism which impels noble self-sacrificing men to labor for their fellow-men. This is the spirit in which Mr. Thompson has entered into the gubernatorial contest and it is the sentiment which strikes the spark of loyalty in every breast which recognizes it. Men of this stamp are not obliged to stoop to the abuse or misrepresentation of their political opponents to find favor among men.

It is generally agreed amongst the most profound legal authorities in the state that women cannot legally perform the duties of any county office. But even could they do so; imagine a lady school superintendent making tours of this county inspecting and keeping in good order the work under her control! In smaller counties and more thickly populated districts where facilities for traveling are better and the highways passable at all times, possibly this objection might not be so effectively urged as it can be here. But everybody knows the difficulty under which a lady would labor to make even brief trips throughout the county during summer months to say nothing of the almost impossibility of such efforts during the balance of the year. There has never been a lady school superintendent in Oregon, nor can there be until a change is wrought in our constitution. In 1886 a woman was chosen to be a candidate for school supt., in one of the counties of the state but, finding that she was ineligible to the office, her husband's name was inserted, the gentleman was elected and she used his name in all of the official acts connected with that office for the term, she being simply a deputy. Should a lady receive a majority of votes cast for superintendent this June, in our opinion the legality of her qualifying could, and probably would, be successfully contested. But from present indications, a lady will not be elected.

Mr. W. A. Jolly, the republican candidate for sheriff is well prepared to assume the duties of that office if so willed by a large majority of the voters of Benton county. He is a straightforward, industrious and worthy citizen who attends to his own business and does that well. He evidently believes that "whatever is worth doing is worth doing well." We believe he will make a good sheriff and one who will discharge the duties of his office in a satisfactory manner. He should have the full vote of the republican party, and the vote of every moral citizen at the coming election.

Mr. W. S. Hufford, who resides at Newport, is looked upon as a man well fitted to discharge the duties of the office of county judge. He has resided in Newport for a number of years and has been successful in the practice of law in the courts held in the county, and we do not think that we disregard a popular sentiment when we urge his eligibility for this office. Who gives Mr. Hufford their support will not have cause to regret their choice.

DEMOCRATIC AND REPUBLICAN HONESTY.

The misapplication of state funds by Treasurer Archer, of Maryland, brings to mind the fact that there have been several democratic state treasurers who have helped themselves to the money and securities entrusted to their keeping. A list of these defaulting state treasurers and the amounts of their shortage is as follows: State Treasurer Churchill, of Arkansas, shortage, \$80,522 01; State Treasurer Polk, of Tennessee, shortage, 400,000 00; State Treasurer Vincent, of Alabama, shortage, 243,148 94; State Treasurer Tate, of Kentucky, shortage, 247,028 50; State Treasurer Burke, of Louisiana, shortage, \$27,000 00; State Treasurer Nolan, of Missouri, shortage, 32,445 00; State Treasurer Hemingway, of Mississippi, shortage, 815,000 00; State Treasurer Archer, of Maryland, shortage, 200,000 00. Total, \$2,345,144 45

An examination of this list will show that these democratic defaultations have all occurred in states where political frauds have been most flagrant. If there is no respect for the rights of individuals the moral sense of the community becomes blunted and the rights of the state are not considered. It will be remembered that when the republican party in 1885 yielded up its power after twenty-four years of uninterrupted control over the affairs of the government, the democrats asserted that when they got at the books they would be sure to discover all sorts of dishonesty. In fact, this was one of their great campaign cries; and the then vice presidential democratic candidate was especially vehement in his charges of fraud upon the treasury by the republicans. It will also be remembered that when the books were examined, the most critical search could only discover a shortage of two cents, and even this sum it was afterwards found could not have been stolen.

The contrast between republican and democratic conduct of funds, state and national, is very great. The different results are due to the different standards of honesty. A free ballot and a fair count are essential to honesty of administration of state as well as national affairs.—Toledo Blade.
