SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.--The Benton County Association held its annual convention at the Presbyterian Church in this city on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. It was well attended by delegates from abroad, and the papers read and the discussions which arose were very interesting and profitable. F. M. Johnson, Esq., who has been president of the association during the past seven years, deserves much credit for the zeal and fidelity with which he has organized and managed this important interest of Christian work in our county. Prof. W. E. Yates, our county superintendent elect, was chosen president for the ensuing year as Mr. Johnson wished to be relieved. Prof. W. N. Hull, one of the most experienced and successful Sunday school workers in the state was chosen vice-president. A rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Johnson and Prof. Sheak for their faithful labors as president and secretary of the association. A very efficient executive committee were appointed of which Rev. H. P. Satchwell is chairman, to which is entrusted the plans and work of the coming year.

DECORATION DAY.--Last Friday, Decoration day was observed in this city in an appropriate manner. All business houses were closed and the citizens in general turned out and took in the exercises for which the day was set apart, that of decorating the graves of their departed with flowers. The program as published in the GAZETTE last week was successfully carried out under the supervision of Ellsworth Post, G. A. R., and the Ladies' Relief Corps. Rev. A. Rogers of the Congregational church delivered a very interesting and appropriate address, at Crystal Lake cemetery.

CHANGED HANDS.--W. H. O'Donald, a thorough and experienced mechanic of Portland, has leased the Corvallis planing mills of I. L. Hurd for a term of three years, taking charge of the mills last Monday. Mr. O'Donald is having the mill overhauled and put in shape to turn out all classes of work in his line such as sash, doors, job work, etc., on short notice.

THE STREET RAILROAD.--The rails are now laid from the post office to Job's addition. The crossings of the S. P. and O. P. tracks will be put in next week. Three teams are at work hauling dirt for fills. In a week or ten days the cars will be running.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the State Association of Congregational Churches will convene in Salem on Tuesday, June 24th, and will remain in session until the evening of the 26th. This meeting will be composed of all the Congregational ministers in the state and delegates from all the churches. All these bodies, in the Congregational denomination, are simply advisory, and none of them assume any legislative powers, for the local church is its own highest authority. All associations are for the cultivation of the spirit of fellowship and for mutual helpfulness. As there is no legislative business to attend to each session is devoted to the consideration of some subject that is of interest to all who love Christ's church and the growth of his kingdom.

There are comparatively few Congregational churches in the West, because it is a principle of the denomination to go only into unoccupied fields, or into places where there is need for a church. All Christian churches are recognized as such, and while Congregationalism is different from all other denominations, it most cordially unites with all in hearty co-operation in building up the Kingdom of God in the world.

The program for the next association will have for its general subject, "The Church of Jesus Christ," and will consider it under nine topics as follows: The Organization of the early churches, The Church in Worship, The Church and Education, The Church and the Common People, The Church in the Sunday School, The Church and the Young People, Meeting Houses for the Church and Parsonages for Pastors, The Church and Temperance, and What can we Learn from other Branches of the Church.

Rev. A. Rogers, of this city, will preach the opening sermon, and Rev. C. Curtis, of The Dalles, will preach the communion sermon. A. R.
