FARMERS' INSTITUTE.—A farmers'
institute will convene at Grants Pass
on August 28th. Pres. Arnold, Prof.
Washburne, and Prof. Irish, of the
agricultural college, will probably at-
tend this meeting. An institute will
also convene at Union on September
10th which will be attended by Profs.
French, Letcher and Washburne, of
the agricultural college.

EXCURSION TO NEWPORT.—In re-
sponse to the numerous requests an-
other popular excursion will be given
to Newport. A special train will leave
Albany at 4 p. m., Saturday, August
2nd, arriving about 7:20 p. m., return-
ing leave Yaquina at 4:45 p. m., the
following day. Those who wish to re-
main until Monday have the privilege
of returning on the regular train that
day. The train will pass Corvallis at
4:30 p. m. Fare from Corvallis and
return \$1.75.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—F. J. Parker,
editor of the Walla Walla Statesman,
met with a serious accident last Sat-
urday. He had mounted one of his
ponies preparatory to going to Elk
City from his summer resort, near Ya-
quina bay, to meet his wife, who was to
arrive from Walla Walla on that day.
The pony became unmanageable and
reared back, falling upon Mr. Parker,
the pommel of the saddle entering
deep into his groin and making a pain-
ful and serious wound.

CONTRACT AWARDED.—D. C. Schell,
of Albany, was awarded the contract
for constructing the state reform school
building near Salem, for \$26,500.
Certain conditions were imposed, how-
ever, which prevented him from accept-
ing the contract. The chief trouble is
that the amount is considerably in ex-
cess of the amount appropriated for
that purpose, and the contractor would
have to advance some \$9000 and await
the action of the legislature for his
money. The contract has since been
re-let to G. A. Stevens, of Salem, who
will begin work at once.

SAMPLES.—Geo. F. Eglin, of the
W. V. & S. L. & L. Co. and Wm.
Hartless, of Hartless & Davison were
in the country last Sunday procuring
samples of Benton county's products.
They obtained quite a large collection
of grains and grasses which, with what
has been already contributed, makes a
very nice display in their respective
offices. Mr. Eglin will soon forward
his collection to the board of informa-
tion at Portland together with such
other samples as may be contributed
within the next few days. Hartless &
Davison will make a display at the
Northwestern exposition which begins
at Portland in September.

INCENDIARISM.—Marshal Ross has
succeeded in capturing and getting
confessions from the boys who have
been burning barns in Salem recently,
eight having been burned by them.
The boys are Tommy Townsend, aged
12; Walter Tasker, aged 13, and Dick
Ely, aged 9. They burned the barns
for fun, being anxious to see the ex-
citement of engines making a run. It
was decided to give the boys no pun-
ishment, being so young and not re-
alizing the enormity of the crime, and
they were given in the custody of their
parents for punishment. The other
boys say that Townsend hired them to
do the work, paying 10 cents for one
job, 20 for another, and a white rabbit
for a third.

Not Disposed to Invest in Silverware.

quired the price.

the article to the shipping-room.

"What! she almost screamed. 'One
hundred and twenty dollars for that?'

Wall, I swan.' For a few moments
they gazed at me as if I had expressed
an intention of robbing them, after
which they conferred together.

Presently the old gentleman turned
around, and in a quivering voice said
he guessed they'd better buy a plated
tureen, as that was just as good.

"We have several dozen designs in

been produced and was selling for \$16.

guessed we didn't have anything to suit

the only one in the country.'"

Russian Technical Schools.

Russia is organizing a system of
technical schools of a very complete
form. The schools are of three classes,
lower and middle technical, and upper,
or, as they are called, trade schools.
The first consists of three divisions, for
mechanics, chemists, and builders re-
spectively. The second class is in-
tended for assistant engineers, and
architects, foremen builders, and agri-
cultural bailiffs.

FREE READING ROOM.—This paper

in common with the ladies connected
with the W. C. T. U. and others, is
happy to announce that the accounts
against the free reading rooms are all
settled; that the institution is entirely
out of debt. Those who visit these
rooms have free access to good books
and the leading periodicals. The
rooms are open to the public, and
strangers are especially welcome. There
are a number of furnished rooms up-
stairs in the building which are for
rent, the proceeds of which are applied
to the fund for the support of that in-
stitution.

The wormy apple has again made its

appearance in the market, and what is
worse, they meet with ready sale at
present. Sound apples are preferable,
of course, but so long as there is a
market for the infested fruit, it is need-
less to advise the farmers to either
take care of their orchards or cut them
down. We do not blame the farmers
so much for selling such fruit as long

and willing to nibble the apple from
around such fine specimens of codlin
moth as the Oregon fruit produces.

The Scio Press, which for some time

on account of its typographical appear-
ance and general worthlessness, has
been an eye sore to those who permit-
ted its weekly visits, has been trans-
formed into a bright, newsy, and useful
sheet under the management of Mr.
T. L. Dugger, who recently assumed
proprietorship. The last number is a
credit to the little town of Scio and to
the newspaper fraternity.

One woman has made the silk

gowns of the justices of the United
States supreme court for the past forty
years, and she gets one hundred dol-
lars for each one of them. They are
all made alike, the only difference be-
ing in the material, the chief justice
wearing black Chinese satin, while his
associates are robed in black silk.

The people of the United States,

during the year 1889, smoked 3,955,
955,773,772 cigars, which at five cents
each, cost the consumers \$165,788,
686.10. This sum at \$20,000 a mile,
would have built 8686 miles of rail-
road, and at \$800 each would have
purchased 20,973 locomotives.
