PUBLIC SCHOOL NOTES.

Five new pupils entered school Monday. The enrollment at present is about 365—one for each day in the year and about 61 for each teacher. Most schools have not over 40 or 50 pupils per teacher which is as many as a teacher can do full justice to.

The newly seated room is now occupied by Mrs. Callahan and her pupils. The changing of classes necessary to the occupying of the new room and the relieving of the crowded rooms occupied Monday morning. In making the changes it was found necessary to divide two of the grades, placing half in one room and half in another. By this change no one was promoted and no one put back but all will continue the same work as before. The present distribution of grades gives Miss Newton the first grade (primary), including both chart and first reader classes, Misses Lilly, Harris, Hoffman and Mrs. Callahan each one and one-half grades, and the principal two grades. None of the teachers have any idle moments on their hands, while the principal with two full grades of the higher classes where the actual teaching work is more difficult, is expected to have general supervision of the whole school. He surely will have no time to waste. The number of pupils in each of the six rooms is now about equal with few or no vacant seats.

Attendance has been quite regular but within a few days a number have been absent through fear of scarlet fever. No pupils are allowed at school who are known to have been exposed to any contagious disease and with the care taken in this regard pupils at school are less liable to exposure to such diseases than those on the streets. Whenever the pupils are in greater danger in school than out the schools will be closed by the proper authorities—until then it is as safe or safer for pupils to attend than not. Pupils who have been exposed to or afflicted by any contagious disease should not return to school without a note from the attending physician stating when such attendance will be safe.

SENATOR MITCHELL.—Senator J. H. Mitchell arrived in Salem Tuesday night and was interviewed by a Statesman reporter. The senator talked of matters of interest to the state and among other things said he regretted that the river and harbor appropriation for the upper Willamette is no greater. The harbor appropriation is satisfactory and he believes that the next appropriation will recognize the needs and wants of this region by giving a sufficient sum with which to place and keep the river open to navigation during the twelve months of the year. Among the bills passed by the late congress for the greatest good of the state Senator Mitchell thinks the Northern Pacific lands forfeiture bill is one of the most important. It opens for homesteaders and settlers over 3,000,000 acres of land in Oregon. The river and harbor appropriation for Oregon was over a million and a half, of which nearly 200,000 goes to Yaquina and a still larger sum for the Columbia jetties. A light tender for the north coast is to be built at a cost of \$25,000, and \$60,000 will go for a lighthouse at the mouth of the Columbia. The matter of the life saving station ordered at Newport is in charge of the department and it is confidently expected something looking towards its establishment will be done soon.

A RANCHER'S MISTAKE.—The first of the week a well-known farmer residing about fifteen miles west of Corvallis, was returning home from Independence in an intoxicated condition he stopped at a farm house and undertook to enter without the usual formality of obtaining permission. The man discovered that the lady of the house was alone and redoubled his efforts to obtain admission, the while using insulting and obscene language. He was endeavoring to make an entrance through a window when the lady seized a shotgun and attempted to discharge it toward the intruder. The cap failed to explode, but a second attempt was more successful. The charge of shot grazed the side of the man's face and he fled. The offender has a respectable family and when sober is well-behaved, himself, and the incident is unfortunate for all concerned.

BOARD OF TRADE RESOLUTIONS.

Last Saturday evening the board of trade held a special meeting at which the following resolutions were adopted by a large majority of the members present: The propriety of passing on such a resolution by the board of trade was discussed at some length and with some warmth by Messrs. John Burnett, J. R. Bryson, James A. Cauthorn, F. M. Johnson and others in favor and by Mr. W. S. McFadden against it. The following are the resolutions as adopted:

WHEREAS, We recognize the fact that the building of the O. P. R. R. has been of more practical benefit to the city of Corvallis and this county than any other enterprise or undertaking and extending in its effects to every person in our county, bringing with its completion, cheaper and quicker transportation and a better market for our products and giving new and vigorous impetus to all the industries in our county. We feel that these direct and visible benefits are largely due to the personal efforts of Col. T. Egerton Hogg, and his assistants, Wm. M. Hoag and Wallis Nash, in building said railroad, and the people of this community, now, as before, regard him as a personal benefactor and desire to express our warm appreciation of his services and our entire and unqualified confidence in his ability and integrity.

WHEREAS, The Corvallis Times in its last issue made an attack upon the officers of the O. P. R. R. Co., which is wholly unwarranted and which we regard as utterly malicious and untrue in its spirit, inception and entirety; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we take this occasion as members of the board of trade and citizens of Corvallis to express our condemnation of the article which appeared in the last issue of the Corvallis Times under head of "Railroad Monstrosity," and we do not approve of the same and unqualifiedly pronounce it false from beginning to end and we regard the course of the Times on this matter as opposed to the best interests of our city and feel that it only represents the personal malice of its proprietor or proprietors. Be it further

Resolved, That we have the utmost confidence in, and respect for the integrity of the local officers of such company, Wm. M. Hoag and Wallis Nash, and do not look upon temporary inability to meet corporate liabilities as involving moral turpitude or warranting any personal attacks upon the general or local officers of said company.

FOR HIS THIRD TERM.—That man Peck, who was put in the penitentiary Friday for a term of one year, coming from Lane county, is serving his third term in Oregon's state prison, and there is a fourth term in good prospect for him. He is the man who hired a horse and buggy in Corvallis in the summer to go to Philomath and who led Mr. Eglin such a lively chase into the Cascades when the rig was recovered, having been abandoned by the culprit. Peck eluded the officers for a time but was finally captured at Roseburg by the sheriff of Lane, from which county he was sent to the penitentiary for embezzling funds belonging to the Singer Sewing Machine Co. If Peck gets his just deserts he will be returned to the penitentiary from this county for grand larceny as soon as his present term expires. His case, says the Statesman, is quite an argument in favor of the unlimited sentence idea recently introduced in an eastern state. By its provisions a prisoner is always sentenced to an unlimited term. He is released on good behavior—given his freedom on probation, as it were. He must report every month to some officer whose duty it is to keep record of all men on probation. By this means an honest man can redeem himself, but a scoundrel is soon taken in charge again, thus saving to the state very many dollars for arrest, incarceration, prosecution, etc.

Rev. C. W. Hill, of Portland, delivered a most excellent sermon at the Presbyterian church last Sabbath evening. The large audience present enjoyed it very much. Mr. Hill is the State Missionary of the Baptist Association of Oregon.

CLEAN UP AGAIN.—A number of our citizens owning attractive residences have removed the fences from about their premises which adds much to their appearance. Others could do likewise with similar results, but the fences should be removed entirely—not torn down and allowed to lie in the street. There are a number of instances in which parties have evinced a spirit of enterprise in laying new sidewalk, but allow the old boards to lie alongside. Not long since, the city council issued imperative instructions to the marshal to order property owners to clean up all rubbish in alleys and elsewhere. The marshal and the people performed their duties in the matter, but the city has lapsed into its former condition, and it is time another imperative order were issued. The order, too, should include the removal of the boards which composed the old fence and sidewalk about the premises recently purchased by the city.

BUSINESS HOUSES IN DEMAND.—On Monday morning it was announced that Mr. Roberts, the jeweler, would close up his business in Corvallis. Before that evening application for the building which he occupies was made by four or five persons who desired to rent it for business purposes. Before the foundation of Fisher's new brick was laid he had several applications for the rental of each room. This is a strong argument for the construction of commodious and substantial brick buildings in the business part of Corvallis, and is evidence that the prosperity of the city is retarded by a lack of enterprise.

Members of the Benton County Prune Company met Wednesday and elected, as directors, W. H. Mahoney, E. E. Paddock, E. R. Lake, J. Blumburg, E. L. Quinn, J. R. Markley, C. E. Hunt, Sol Stock, Chas. Clark, J. P. Bergin, Robt. Johnson, W. H. Hartless and M. S. Neugass. W. H. Hartless was elected president; J. P. Bergin vice-president; E. E. Paddock treasurer; M. S. Neugass secretary. An assessment of 15 per cent. was levied. The company have purchased 18,000 Italian prune trees which are to be delivered about the 15th of December.

A SURGICAL OPERATION.—Yesterday Dr. Hill performed a surgical operation upon William Lewis of Philomath. For many weeks Mr. Lewis has been suffering from an inability to breathe easy through the nose. The malady increased until breathing was entirely obstructed. He then came to this city and consulted a physician who pronounced the cause to be a polypus in the nose and successfully performed the operation of removing it.—Albany Herald.
