FINAL REPORT OF GRAND JURY.

To Honorable M. L. Pipes, Circuit Judge:

We the Grand Jury of Benton county submit this our final report:

We have inquired into all crimes committed or triable in this county that have been brought to our knowledge and have presented them to the court when required by law or justified by the evidence before us.

We have examined into the condition and management of the county jail and we recommend that some provision be made by the coty for the proper keeping of its prisoners.

Persons are placed in the county jail to await the determination of a jury as to their guilt or innocence, and pending that decision they should, in our opinion, be kept in a place of safe confinement, but not in one unfit for human beings.

We have visited the offices pertaining to the courts of justice in the county and find them kept in a neat, orderly and satisfactory manner.

And now having completed our labors, we ask to be finally discharged.
