

ENRAGED BIRDS.

How a Horse Was Set Upon by a Quartet of Blue Jays.

Along one side of a field on the Meyers farm, says a Lancaster (Pa.) correspondent of the N. Y. Sun, there is a thick growth high and strong. Many kinds of small birds find this thicket most favorable for their nesting places, and in the spring eagles and hawks that pasture the field browse on the sweet and tender young foliage. The owner of the farm turned in the field to pasture a few days ago a number of cattle, among them two bay horses. The farmer was working in a field, not far from the thicket, when he heard blue jays making more noise than usual even with these noisy birds. Looking up to see what the trouble might be, he saw four blue jays engaged in a fierce assault on one of the horses. They were darting at him from all sides, pecking at his face, striking him in the neck and sides, and about the head, in a manner that was evidence enough that the horse had been bitten in some aggravated way. The poor horse ran first one way and then another to escape the fury of the excited birds, but he was headed off whichever way he turned by the birds dashing fiercely at his face and assaulting him with their beaks. Fearing that the sharp-billed and persistent jays would blind the horse, the farmer hurried to his aid. Even after he arrived on the scene and took the horse by the mane and led him away from the spot the infuriated birds hovered about and followed him for a long distance, making frequent descents upon the horse's body, and inflicting blows that made him wince and jump as if he were being stung with spur. The farmer led the horse to the other side of the field, and the birds returned to the thicket, where they held a noisy consultation at a particular spot, and seemed to be in great tribulation.

To discover if possible what had aroused the extreme anger of the blue jays against the horse the farmer walked over to the thicket, and at the spot where the clamor of the birds was so great he found the dead bodies of three newly hatched blue jays. The old birds circled about him furiously a moment and then dashed away across the field to where the horse had resumed its feeding and renewed their attack on him. The farmer hurried back to the protection of the horse again. The poor animal was dashing frantically about, while the birds pecked and struck him. The scene was a terrible sight. The farmer roused the horse the second time and the birds flew back to the bushes. Every time the horse was left to himself, however, the blue jays would renew the attack on him and the owner of the horse was at last compelled to take the animal back to the barn. The jays made no attack on the other horse, which was feeding not far from the thicket.

The next day the horse that had excited the animosity of the blue jays was turned in the lot again, but he had not been there only a short time when the birds discovered his presence and attacked him as fiercely as they had the previous day, and he was taken home. A road passed on the other side of the thicket and is constantly traveled by teams. The scene of the attack of the jays on the bay horse was hatched up to drive to a neighboring village on the road mentioned. As he was being driven past the thicket he was set upon by blue jays again, and the result was that the driver could not hold him and he ran away, breaking the wagon to pieces and endangering the life of his driver. As this state of affairs if continued promised to be disastrous to the farm and the farmer the offending jays have been hunted down and shot. The only explanation that can be given of this enmity of the blue jays against the horse is that while he was browsing along the edge of the thicket he pulled down a branch on which a flock of blue jays had their nest and shook the young ones out of the nest to the ground. The jays and neighboring jays sought revenge upon the despoiler of this nest hence the bitter and unrelenting fight they made upon him.

The Useful Camanba Tree.

The camanba is certainly a wonderful tree, according to a report made to the State Department by Consul of Bahia. It grows in the northern States of Brazil, near the Amazon River. Every part of it—root, rootlet, branch, and trunk—is available; it is indispensable for the natives in building and roofing their huts, making fences, etc., while the articles made from it supply them with food, light, and medicine. It is a species of palm tree and grows in dry, sandy soil.

The bulb (the size depending upon the size of the tree) is strongly farinaceous, and when dried and ground produces a kind of farinacea used for food by the natives, while the rootlets of the bulb are used for medicine, possessing a strong cathartic property. The trunk, while the tree is young, contains a soft oleaginous substance, something like marrow; this is good for cattle, sheep, goats, and hogs. After the tree attains a growth of several years the trunk becomes very hard and can then be used for building purposes. The lower part of the branches, which grow to a length of 8 to 10 or 12 feet, are chiefly used for fences. They are wide and flat at the bottom and tapering toward the top, with short, hard, and very sharp thorns at its edges, in appearance not unlike the mouth of a sawfish. The fence made from this material is very strong. The leafy part of the branch, when cut and sun-dried, gives an exudation which appears on the fan-like leaf or blade. It is a tenacious substance possessing properties very similar to beeswax. This was extensively used for making candles. The leaf or blade has a fiber from which hats, mats, baskets, rope, brooms, dusters, etc., are made. When the exudation is scraped from the blades of palm the branches are used for roofing huts and small houses and for protecting brick walls from the fierce rays of the sun, as well as from the rain. The fruit of the tree is sweet and palatable. The kernel or seed is pounded to powder and used in infusion in place of coffee.

STRANGE EXPERIENCE.

A Toledo Man Lives Through an Age in Thirty Seconds.

A Toledo man was sitting in an office on Adam street recently chatting with the occupant, a well-known young lawyer, when the conversation turned to dreams and the rapidity with which the brain worked during sleep. "Yes," remarked the legal gentleman, "the brain is a marvelous contrivance. If that fact ever slipped my memory it was brought forcibly to my mind several days since. I will tell you how it happened. I was suffering from a thumping toothache, and resolved to have the tooth out. Accordingly I made for the nearest dentist's while my determination was strong, and, dropping into a dental chair answered to his 'Will you take gas?' in the affirmative. It was an initial experience with the fluid, but I inhaled it without experiencing any peculiar sensation at first.

"I noticed presently, however, that the office clock ticked abnormally loud; in fact, it soon was pounding away like one of Krupp's giant hammers. Finally I drifted away into another state and found myself in a strange city. Several months passed and numerous trivial things happened which I remember vividly, even the minutest details. Somehow or other I got in with a fair crowd of young men, and one night, during a quarrel over a game of poker, I shot and fatally wounded one of my companions.

"I was arrested, and after the usual preliminary proceedings my case came up for trial in the Court of Common Pleas. The trial was a long one, remembering well the district attorney's examining up and the strong defense my attorney made in my behalf, but without avail, for the court sentenced me to be executed by electricity, a strange and fearful death. My lawyer got a stay of execution of the sentence, and the case was carried to the Circuit court. Another lengthy trial ensued, concluding by the judge confirming the decision of the lower court, and I again became reconciled to the thought of being executed. My lawyer was untiring, and finally made another attempt to save my life, carrying the case to the Supreme court. I think something like a year and a half elapsed before the case came to trial for the third time.

"However, its conclusion bore no fruit to my liking, for I was again sentenced to an electrical execution. I spent many weary days in prison, and it was a relief when the day set apart for my death came around. I awoke early, bathed, ate a hearty meal, and at 10 o'clock when the turnkey beckoned me to follow him to the death-room I was wholly prepared to depart this life. I seated myself in the somewhat clumsy chair and my arms and legs were strapped tightly down. A dampened sponge was placed on my head, and although I did not know it, the executioner was making ready to make me a human conductor. I closed my eyes, but opened them just in time to see the jailer drop a white handkerchief. At the same instant the current was turned on. A dreadful wrenching, burning pain shot through my system and then—and then I came to. The tooth had just been pulled, and I was under the influence of gas just thirty seconds. Yes, the human brain is a rapid worker."

PARALYZED BY A SCRATCH.

Peculiar Experience of a Maine Man on the Field of Battle.

"I have read of men being paralyzed by a wound and unable to move," said a well-known prominent Maine officer to a reporter of the Lewiston Journal, and I believe it. I know that there have been many cases of the kind, and one of them in particular has such a personal twist that I have good reason to remember.

"It was at the battle of Chancellorsville, in the early part of the fight. We had approached a low, rambling fence—a Virginia fence, as they were called, and I had my gun through it and was doing what service I could. I saw the splinter fly from a piece of that fence under the impulse of a ball from the enemy. In the lightning flash of the flying wood I seemed to find time to dodge, and then there was a quick pain like the searing of a hot iron and the splinter was through my hat-band and along my scalp, penetrating it, but not injuring the skull.

"The blow was severe and stunned me, and I remember as well my last look at the scene—the fighting troops, the smoke, the battle and the trampling men. I fell back, my legs half doubled up beneath me, and in a moment my strength was gone and I was powerless. I saw everything. Men fell upon me. Men trampled upon me. Horses reared around me. The battle was on all sides.

"My wits were clear, my brain unclouded, but there was I, dying a death momentarily, alive, yet dead, and suffering more tortures than I thought life could have. I lay there perhaps half an hour—every moment a year of agony—when I felt some one's hand on my collar, and I was dragged out and turned on my face, where I lay for a moment as some one rifled my cartridge box. The motion saved me. My pulse seemed to stir, my heart beat, my will to re-exert itself, and in a few moments I was myself. The wound was so small that I stanchied it with my handkerchief and in half an hour I was as well as ever.

"If the hand had not found my collar I should have been bleaching my bones on Chancellorsville at this moment instead of being here talking to you, and it would have been tough to have passed in on such a scratch."

Stealing Horses in Idaho.

Over eight hundred horses were stolen last winter from the range in Idaho, situated between Salmon and Snake rivers. The range is almost destitute of horses. There is no question that the thieves are thoroughly organized and operate in a systematic manner, with agents scattered to dispose of the stock, which are crossed on rafts to the Oregon and Washington side of the Snake river.

The book reader staggers toward an inviting fence and just as he crawls up to a place of safety he feels the hot breath of the dog as the brute prepares to sink his teeth into the agent's neck; but they never sink. The agent opens his eyes, stares around the cozy room, and exclaims, "Only a dream!"

In the agent's long list of experiences, the Bridget, man, club and dog are real, and it has been the business of the agent's profession to learn the habits, peculiarities and disposition of these antagonistic subjects, and, if possible, educate them to appreciate the book agent's industry.

Book agents follow the motto, "when everything else fails, try curiosity," and it usually wins. An old farmer south of this city, who had thrown book agents over the fence, allowed his curiosity to lead him down to the gate to see a bicycle go by. Just as the young gentleman came up to the gate something went wrong with the wheel, and he stopped to fix it. The old farmer kindly offered his aid, and the wily agent slipped a book into the victim's hand to hold till the wheel was fixed. The conversation turned from bicycle to the book, and the former was repaired about the time the old farmer was ready to subscribe for two of the latter. When the name was well inscribed and the bicyclist out of hearing, the old farmer scratched his head in a rather dazed way and said: "I'll be dinged if that ain't a book agent."—Indianapolis News.

Be Careful How You Sit.

An erect bodily attitude is of vastly more importance to health than most people generally imagine, says the N. Y. Ledger. Crooked bodily positions, maintained for any length of time, are always injurious, whether in a sitting, standing or lying position, whether sleeping or waking. To sit with the body leaning forward on the stomach, or to one who is sleeping, is to sit on a level with the hands, it is not only in bad taste, but exceedingly detrimental to your health; it cramps the stomach, presses the vital organs, interrupts the free motion of the chest and enfeebls the functions of the abdominal and thoracic organs, and, in fact, unbalances the whole muscular system. Many children become slightly humped, or severely rounded, shouldered by sleeping with the head raised on a high pillow. When any person finds it easier to sit or stand or walk or sleep in a crooked position than a straight one, he may be sure his muscular system is deranged and the more careful he should be to preserve an upright position.

Preparation for Foreign Travel.

For a traveling dress, a good English serge is best, gray, or else black and white mixture. It will not tumble, will not show dirt nor dust, and will wear two years, if necessary. Let this be made as plain as possible, showing no buttons, no pockets, no trimmings, except a high collar. It is well to have a dress of some dark silk. Soft surah is preferable, made without many "furbelows," that may pack well in a suitcase. This is to wear at dinner. As for purchasing abroad, almost everything can be bought somewhat cheaper in London, but not so much cheaper as people imagine. Prices are higher than in New York, with the exception of kid gloves. One can get them made to order at a little shop at 232 Rue de Rivoli in Paris for about 75 cents a pair for four buttons, and from that up. Florence is the best place to buy jewelry, especially turquoise and mosaic. The Florentine jewelry is very cheap. It is safe to offer about one-third the original price. Naples is the only place for corals and cameos. Don't buy lace in Brussels, as it can be got in London much cheaper. London is the place to buy books also. Of course France is the place for pictures, and a visitor should be there in May or June to attend the Salon exhibition.

In traveling on the continent, get Bedacker's guide-book. Look up the hotels, and, if intending to stop any place for several days, write ahead for terms. Ask for a price including light and service, as they are always extra. When the price does not include lights, take candles along. The charge for lights is 50 cents a night for each person, and a dozen candles cost but 20 cents. Soap is always extra, except in England.

Those who ask for anything not on the bill of fare will pay handsomely for it. In all the Paris restaurants they charge for the table-cloth and napkins, to begin with. The Paris edition of the New York Herald will give a good deal of information. Bedacker's gives a list of all the hotels and pensions, also cab fares, etc. The second-class, except in the matter of style, are much cheaper. They are generally more comfortable, and the cooking is just as good. A little knowledge of the language of the country goes a great way, and reduces expenses wonderfully.
