OVER AT YAQUINA BAY.—Captain T. W. Symons has returned from a trip to Yaquina bay, where he went to inspect the government works under his charge there. He says the weather during the time he was there was the most delightful he ever saw. The people there have an air of prosperity and contentment, and the depth of water on the bar, about eighteen feet at high water, is very satisfactory. The steamship Willamette Valley went out while he was there, loaded with grain and flour. Captain Symons reports that the South jetty has stood the storms of winter very well. It has sunk a little in some places, and the sea have been cutting in at the foot in some places, but this has all been stopped by dumping rock in at those places. A great deal of preliminary work has been done in stripping and cleaning the quarry in readiness for getting out stone for resuming work on the North jetty. The pile driver is being overhauled and put in complete repair, and as soon as this is done, the work of extending the North jetty, which is now out about 600 feet, will be begun. The South jetty is out to its full contemplated length, but it will be improved and strengthened before it is left. If the present fine weather continues, work will soon be under way on the North jetty.—Oregonian.

IMPROVING THE WILLAMETTE.—At the meeting held in Portland, Sept. 29th, 1890, to organize a State Board of Commerce, among other matters of business, resolutions were presented, asking congress to make an appropriation for the improvement of the bars on the upper Willamette, notably the one just below Salem, one near Wheatland, one near Independence and the so-called Half Moon bend between Albany and Corvallis. The resolutions were referred to the executive committee. At the meeting of the State Board of Commerce held in Salem Jan. 15th, the resolutions were adopted. Mr. J. H. Albart moved that a special committee of three, F. M. Waite, of Salem; J. H. Nicholas, of Corvallis; and Mr. Robertson of Independence, be appointed to wait on Major Hanbury, U. S. engineer, to secure a portion of the last appropriation for the upper Willamette. The committee visited Major Hanbury and were informed that while a portion of the appropriation referred to had been expended he would leave Portland in a few days with a company of men to improve the upper river, so far as the appropriation will go.

THE HOP LOUSE.

Since the presence of the Hop Louse (*Phorodon humuli*) in Oregon has been reported, careful examinations of affected yards have been made and the results apparently corroborate the results of observations made in Europe and America contemporaneously by the Department at Washington. These results are summarized in the statement that "the eggs of the Hop Louse are laid in the autumn on plums and prunes, more particularly the former."

This is now borne out by personal observations in this state, thousands of eggs having been found on sculling thickets of plums near an infested hop yard, while cultivated prunes in the vicinity were not affected.

It is for the purpose of gathering statistics upon this matter, i. e., the varieties of plums preferred, and situation of plums with regard to hop yards that a circular has been issued by the Oregon Experiment Station, in order to record such facts in bulletin report, to be shortly issued, treating of remedies, etc.

It is hoped and expected that every progressive hop grower will interest himself in answering the following questions. The greatest accuracy in the replies is necessary:

1. Have your hops been affected the past year by hop lice? If so to what extent financially, have you suffered?
2. Are there cultivated plums or prunes near your hops? What varieties?
3. Are there any wild plums or seedlings near your hop field? What is their correct name?
4. What is the exact distance of these seedlings (mentioned in No. 3) from your hops?

Cuttings are desired from cultivated plums and prunes near hops and from seedlings mentioned in Nos. 3 and 4. (Send the new wood.)

In every case, give accurately, name of fruit and its distance from hop yard; whether a few yards, rods, a mile, two miles or more.

Postage on such packages is 1 cent for each ounce.

An early reply is desired, and all replies should be in by February 25th, 1891.
