BEAT THE RECORD.—On the last trip up from San Francisco the steamship Willamette Valley beat the record from San Francisco to Yaquina City. The time consumed in making the trip from dock to dock being just 48 hours. The steamer arrived at Yaquina in the evening and unloaded her perishable freight during the night, and it arrived in Corvallis the following morning in time to catch the river boats for Portland and way stations.
