A CANNERY AT LAST.

More than a year ago the GAZETTE began the agitation of the cannery question. It seemed at times that the agitation was going to be futile, and again there would be encouragement to inspire renewed determination, in order to arouse the public mind on the importance of the matter. So the GAZETTE has kept firing away; and at last there are evident indications of approaching reality. Sure enough Corvallis is to have a cannery. The parties responsible for the scheme do not wish to have their names mentioned at this time, but they assure us that the institution will be backed with plenty of capital, and that it is going to be run on a first-class business basis. An evaporator for fruits and a jelly contrivance will be among the prominent features of the concern, as well as vinegar and cider works and an arrangement for pickling purposes. Parties, appointed for the purpose, are now away investigating other canneries, to gain points of information that may prove quite profitable in the construction of the cannery. The GAZETTE, as well as the other papers of this city that have assisted in pushing the matter ahead, takes a pardonable pride in the cannery movement, having been one of its staunchest advocates since the agitation began many months ago. It will do all within its power to further the interests of the movement, and hopes before the lapse of another year to see a first-class cannery doing a first-class business in Corvallis.

THE FLAG RAISING.—The children of the public school manifested an unusual degree of interest at the flag raising exercises last Friday afternoon. Supt. E. B. McElroy, F. M. Johnson and T. Graham made appropriate remarks to the assembled pupils in the hall, which was filled to its utmost capacity. The rooms were profusely decorated with bunting and ornamented with flowers. Many recitations were listened to. Prof. McElroy said he was much pleased with the work, and the board expressed satisfaction. The children had a right to feel a great interest in the matter, as the flag was purchased with their own money. Lessons of patriotism to the youth make loyal men and women in the years to come, so these efforts have not been wasted. Prof. Blanchard deserves credit for the success of the occasion.

MORE MANUFACTURES.—At the office of the secretary of state, Salem, last Tuesday, David Morris, W. Q. Adams and S. T. Jefferys filed articles incorporating the Corvallis Foundry and Manufacturing Company, with the proposition to conduct and operate a foundry and machine shop in this city representing a capital stock of \$10,000. Immediate steps are being taken toward the establishment of this important institution, and Corvallis will soon be justly considered a manufacturing center, with the action on the "fact." Work on the new foundry is now in progress, and it will shortly be in a thoroughly repaired condition, and ready for operations. Mr. Adams will soon move up from Portland with his family, and permanently locate in Corvallis, where his time and attention will be devoted to the interests of this institution.

SILLY SANCTITY.—Rev. Morgan's new doctrinal disquisition on Scriptural precepts delivered by him at the opera house in this city the past week called out unusual attentances of curious people. They made good music for many of our citizens, but it appeared that they didn't make anything else. He made very little impression on his hearers, and his spurious predictions will have vanished before the dawn of the coming springtime, when he says seven years of suffering for mankind will begin. Mr. Morgan exclaims himself above angelhood, for the truth declares that of "His (Christ's) day and coming, no man shall know, not even the angels in heaven." We deny him the privilege of being a prophet or the son of a prophet.

INCREASED ASSESSMENT.—City Assessor J. M. Porter has completed the city assessment roll, and the extension of the corporate limits of the city puts a considerable increase on the totals. The total valuation of real estate aggregates \$612,400; of personal property, \$328,234; total valuation of all property, \$940,634. In 1890, the valuation was \$513,579; exemptions, \$21,740, leaving the value of the total taxable property at \$712,315. The tax levy, which will be five mills, will run the total amount of taxes to \$3,561.57, an increase over last year of \$1,175.48. This will make a good showing in the city's exchequer for the coming year, and the money no doubt will be applied to beneficial requirements.

RESUMING RIVER TRAFFIC.—The recent rains are bringing the river to a good boating stage. More water is coming down every day, and it will be but a few days, at the present rate of rise, until there will be water sufficient for resuming river traffic. The Three Sisters left Portland the other day and is expected to arrive at Corvallis at any time. This is the first steamer to ply the waters this far this season. It is understood that the Oregon Pacific steamers will run regularly almost at once. There are large quantities of river freight to be moved this year, and when the boats do get regularly started there will be plenty of work to keep them busy for many weeks to come.

It is ordered by the decision of the circuit court that the Oregon Pacific railroad be sold at sheriff's sale, and the ninth of December has been named as the date of sale. The O. P. pay car went over the western division of the road to Yaguna Tuesday, paying the employees for the months of March, April and May. The amount of this payment is about \$30,060.
