REMINISCENCES OF A PIONEER.

PAPER NUMBER SIX.

On the coast proper the bay widens out, there being anchorage for a large fleet of vessels of any description, a land locked harbor in which any vessel can lie in the heaviest storms as steady as a church. At the terminus of the railroad there is quite a village, known as Yaquina City, at which place there is no speculation, for the reason that there is no property in the immediate vicinity for sale. Four miles further down the bay, immediately on the coast, and a half mile from the bar of the Yaquina bay, where it empties into the Pacific ocean, is the town of Newport. Properties in this town, which could have been bought twenty years since for \$25 per lot are now worth and are selling for \$100 per foot front. This being a sea side resort, of course it is quite popular in the summer months, as the majority of the people coming into this section of the country congregate at this particular place, where they can get the most satisfaction and enjoyment for the least amount of money. My experience of over twenty years has been, that no matter in what locality a man may place himself, he may err in judgment as to prospective values. For instance, in 1875, I had offered to me, acreage property within a radius of three miles of this place; the purchase price was to be about \$25, and a land right for one hundred and sixty acres of land. The same land within the thirty days last past, has been held against a bona fide offer of \$150 cash, per acre. Two men in particular have realized comfortable fortunes out of a very small investment. For instance, one party bought 200 acres of land or thereabouts, ten years since, of improved land, good title, etc., for which he paid the sum of \$1600. Nine years later he sold the same for spot cash for the consideration of \$20,000. His neighbor adjoining, had a body of land comprising about 400 acres with but little frontage on anything, beach hills, etc., for which he realized \$20,000. The last named party was not out on said property in actual money to exceed the sum of \$500. The present valuations of property are not as high comparatively speaking, as they were two years since.

In olden times when a man went to the coast with his entire family, in two wagons, with a few head of stock, they would pitch their tent wherever night overtook them, lie around in the sand, bathe in the surf, go fishing every day, get sunburned, well tired out, etc., and return well regulated for another season's hard work on their ranches. I have seen at one time 10,000 wagons camped in this vicinity, which with an average of five people to the wagon, making a population of over 50,000. Of course, this state of things is done away with now, as a person can get on the train any place in the Willamette valley any morning, arrive at the coast at night, and return the next day, if they wish to, for less outlay of actual cash than was necessary in those days. At that time, say ten years since, had a person suggested that within a decade there would be no lot in the town of Newport purchasable for less than \$100, he would have been laughed at and apostrophized as visionary or insane. That state of affairs exists to-day.

The extreme northwest corner of Benton county is occupied by an Indian reservation, which is being opened for public settlement. While it is largely a mountainous region, there are many good homes in this section, there is also some money to be made in placer mining along the ocean beach at the small streams which put into the ocean in this vicinity. The forest fires which destroyed the timber, spoken of heretofore, did not prevail so extensively in this section, and there still remains large quantities of good saw timber, old growth of spruce, fir, hemlock and cedar, which, while it is practically inaccessible at present, cannot fail in a very short time to come to market, the only alternative being to ship the same material there 100 miles by rail or 300 by water. This northwest corner of the county, although it is practically unexplored, is a favorite resort for tourists, pleasure seekers, etc., on account of the natural curiosities such as shell beaches, mineral deposits, etc., all of which are to be found by a pleasant drive over the solid ocean beach. A person can leave Newport in the morning, drive through a country well settled in parts, and totally wild in other parts. The scenery consists of the Pacific ocean on the one hand and the Coast range of mountains on the other, traveling the distance of twenty miles or farther, and return the same day.

Traveling south from Yaquina the country consists of low table lands,

well settled and tolerably well improved for the distance of seventeen miles when we come to the Alsea bay, which is about one-half the size of Yaquina, with a fair settlement, two towns, a cannery, saw mills, etc. Continuing still further south a distance of nine miles we come to the Yachutz river. The country between Alsea and Yachutz is very sparsely settled. For a sportsman, no better opportunity affords, as this is the home of the deer, the elk, trout, etc., and along the coast from Yachutz to Cape Perpetua deep sea fishing is superb without being off of the land to enjoy it. This brings us to the extreme southern line of Benton county. The Yachutz valley is especially a frontier country, where the principal thing is hunting, with some improving. Several years since, beach mining was carried on quite extensively in this vicinity, but the action of the elements, that is, high tides, causing shifting sands, etc., has caused a complete cessation of this industry, as it costs more money to strip one of these beach mines, than can be obtained from them after being worked. At the Alsea, there have been several vessels built for the coasting trade. The lumbering and fishing industries of this bay are superior to most places on the coast, on account of the size and formation of the bay and surrounding country.

Just why this is done, when wood is so plentiful in the Willamette valley, is hard to say. It would be a great thing for our city if our citizens took the pride in them that Mr. Max Friendly does, who is having the trees in front of his residence properly trimmed.

YAQUINA ITEMS.

The Gen. M. Chance came in last Saturday on a smooth bar and twenty feet of water, but the big steamer for San Francisco did not go. This pleases the oystermen very much, as after the oysters have lain on the steamer three or four days they have to take them up to their floats and put them back into the oyster beds. In a day or two they are sacked again and placed on the steamer, and if she does not sail soon they will have to be put through the same process again. Some people think oysters are high priced, but they would not think so if they had to dig for them in twenty-eight feet of water, and handle those long tongue against a strong tide, the wind blowing and rain pouring down upon them; after catching a bushel, give a Ketchikan two bits to cull them. Oh, yes, it is very amusing—and yet it pays—as every other honest labor does.

The sea crabs are now coming in. They make a tasty change in our diet. We are also looking for the run of herring soon. The flounders are as fat as they ever get. Some of our boys are taking time by the forelock and taking their preventive of the gripple by the gallon, and when they are so full they can touch it with their finger in their mouth, it leaves no show for the gripple to get a grip, thus proving a gallon of preventive is worth more than a quart of cure.
