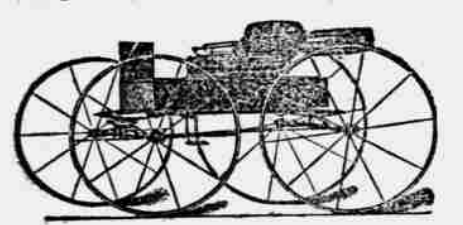

SUFFERS A RELAPSE.—Chas. Strego, the German who was so badly beaten some weeks ago with a club and almost killed, was so far recovered the first of the week that he decided to return to his work at the mill. It is thought that he must have over-exerted himself as he failed to appear at the mill Wednesday morning and when parties went to his house to learn the cause they found him lying in bed in an insensible condition. Drs. Applewhite and Pernot were called and pronounced the case brain fever caused primarily by the terrible beating which he received and aggravated by the undue physical exertion to which he had just subjected himself. He was removed to the Vincent house, where he now is still unconscious and in an extremely critical condition with many chances against his recovery. At a late hour last night it was thought he could not live until morning. This morning, however, he is still in about the same condition and the attending physicians have decided to perform an operation today to see if they cannot relieve the pressure of the skull on the brain, as recovery otherwise is impossible.

TO REVOKE RIGHT OF WAY.—The property owners along the projected line of the S. P. between this city and Junction are evidently becoming weary of the delay to which they have been subjected, and no wonder. When the right of way was given to the Oregon & California railroad company it was with the expectation that the road would be pushed through in a short time. That was years ago and the road is no nearer completion now than it was then. Legal steps are now about to be taken to secure the return of this property to the original owners on the ground that the railroad company has not fulfilled its contract. We don't know whether all the deeds are alike or not, but we have examined a few of those on file in this county and find that they give the company absolute possession, without any conditions whatever, in which case it would seem to a man up to a tree that it would be impossible to regain possession of the land very easily. How about that, anyhow?

The thief is supposed to be a young man about 25 years of age, clean shaven, wearing a brown coat with red spots. A thief who will steal an 18-year-old horse should go to the penitentiary by all means.

FULL PARDON.—Governor Penney has granted a full pardon to Charles Denny, who was convicted in Linn county of assault with intent to kill his sweetheart and was sentenced to a five-year term. He was sentenced to prison July 2, 1891, and had served nine months and ten days. This pardon was granted upon the recommendation of the district attorney.

DUNN.—At her home in this city, Sunday evening July 24th, Mrs. Ella M. Dunn, aged 33 years, 7 months, 16 days.

The deceased was the wife of Mr. James Dunn, of this city, and had been in good health until about two weeks previous to her death, when she was attacked by neuralgia in a severe form, which grew worse until it finally ran in brain fever. Everything possible was done to save her but to no purpose and on Sunday evening she passed away surrounded by her family and friends. Mrs. Dunn was born in Canada December 8th, 1858. The funeral services were held Tuesday in the Catholic church, at which the deceased was a member, and her remains interred in the Catholic cemetery. She leaves a husband and three small children to mourn her departure, also a mother, four brothers and three sisters. The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the bereaved family.

There seem to be several "moonlight mechanics" about our city, who have been playing their nefarious trade on a small scale for some time. TOBACCO IN OREGON.—The 1890 census shows that Oregon has fifty-nine tobacco planters and twelve acres planted to tobacco. The output was 3325 pounds, worth \$666. As a tobacco producing state Oregon stands near the foot of the ladder. Marion county is reported to have raised nine pounds of tobacco in 1889, as against 333 pounds in Josephine county and 120 in Linn.

He proposes to keep it fully up to its present high standard and will at once put in extensive additions to the already large stock and be fully prepared to supply the latest in all kinds of furniture and other home furnishings.

STORE IMPROVEMENTS.—The space in Stock's cash store having proven inadequate to the demands of their business, it was decided to add a balcony to three sides of the store which is now being done and will be completed in time to accommodate their heavy fall stock. This will almost double the capacity of the store. Stocks are bound to keep abreast of the times.

THE FIRST WHEAT.—The first load of wheat in this vicinity for the season of 1892 was hauled to Fischer's mill on Monday, the 25th. There were 72 bushels in the load, which belonged to J. E. Buchanan. It was threshed by his brother's machine on B. T. Taylor's place. No price for wheat has yet been established but will probably be about 61 to 63 cents clear of sacks.

A marriage was interrupted Thursday night by the groom becoming suddenly overcome with the heat and he had to be taken to his hotel, where he has been confined to his bed ever since.

The groom in question is Mr. W. S. Fowler who boards at the Enterprise hotel. Until a short while ago he conducted a livery stable on East Market street, but retired about a year ago with a comfortable fortune. Mr. Fowler is a widower, seventy-five years old, and has several grown children. A short while ago he met Miss Lillie Townsend, a young woman twenty-five years of age, who is employed by J. Bacon & Sons at the glove counter.

The courtship did not last long till the engagement was announced. Mr. Fowler's children, it seems, objected strongly to the marriage and did everything in their power to break off the match. They were unsuccessful, however, and June 15, the day set for the marriage, arrived. The wedding was to take place where Miss Townsend has boarded for several years. Everything was in readiness at the time appointed—the guests, the minister and the happy couple.

Just before the time for the ceremony Mr. Fowler became very faint and would have fallen but for the support of one of the guests. He soon lost consciousness and was taken to the Enterprise hotel in a carriage, where he was put to bed and the doctor summoned. His condition was found not to be serious, but he was suffering from a slight case of sunstroke.—Louisville Courier-Journal.
