THE SILETZ INDIANS.—The allotting of lands on the Siletz reservation, and the report of the commission appointed to negotiate for the purchase of their lands has developed some interesting facts regarding their peculiarities. While Gen. Odell was making the allotments several children were born on the reservation, and invariably the happy father was around the next day to claim an 80 acre allotment for the child. Several deaths occurred, and the allotments of the deceased were taken by others, the dead man losing his title to the allotment. The Indians still have their sweat houses, in which they get themselves into a profuse perspiration, and then rush out and plunge themselves into the river. Halo Gleese, an old chap of 70 summers, who acted as batman for the commission, indulged in the practice every day, and strolled out every morning with a blanket for a bath robe, and sponged himself in the cold spring. There is said to be considerable disease among the Indians, and it is not likely there will be many of them at the end of 25 years to enter into full possession of their land.

TOO MANY LABORERS COMING WEST.—An old resident of Vermont, now stopping temporarily in this city, who has engaged in agricultural pursuits in that state for many years, says one of the great drawbacks to farming in New England is the scarcity of farm help. For a number of years there has been a gradual exodus of farmers' sons and farm laborers to the west. As a result many well improved farms are not cultivated, but are pastured by many of their owners, who have become advanced in the years. He further says that farm laborers receive better pay on an average than in Oregon. This accounts for the apparent over supply of farm laborers in the west.

SPRAYING APPLE TREES.—Last week the GAZETTE urged the importance of spraying and taking proper care of apple trees. Prof. Washburn, of the agricultural college experiment station, states that during the season just passed, they have saved at least \$5 per cent. of the apples, on trees used in the experiment, with three or four sprayings. Twenty cents each, for old and full grown trees will cover the expense of spraying during the season. Consequently the expense of spraying is comparatively nothing, when one considers the much higher price obtained for apples free from the codling moth. The Eugene Register gives another cheap method of killing the moths: Tie a band around the tree, leaving loops under which they will congregate, and occasionally remove the band and kill the pests gathered there. This method has been highly recommended and is a simple treatment.

THE REASON WHY.—The debt of Douglas county is \$12,185.32. And still its warrants sell at a discount of from 2 to 5 per cent., while its indebtedness is not over \$72,000. Benton county's indebtedness is only \$36,000, yet her warrants sell at a discount of 10 to 12 per cent. The Eugene Guard and the CORVALLIS GAZETTE are both anxious to know why this is so. Perhaps the Roseburg papers may be able to enlighten them.—Oregonian.

The reason has often been explained in the Review. It is simply because Treasurer Arrington is a rustler and keeps plenty of private money on hand with which to buy or warrant at a price. The people, too, have faith in the county and are willing to back it with their money.—Roseburg Review.

RIVER TRAFFIC WILL RESUME.—Contrary to most expectations the Willamette has risen to almost twenty inches above low water mark and gives about ten feet of going to three feet by to-morrow. As a result of the high water the Oregon Pacific steamer Hoag, which has been lying at the wharf boat all summer and fall, will start on "cast off all lines" and leave for Portland at 6 a. m. Captain Raabe will have charge of the Hoag. H. C. Day will be purser, while Al McCully will resume his old place as engineer. The boat will make the regular run from Salem to Portland on Saturday, Tuesdays and Thursdays, and from Portland to Salem, Fridays, Monday and Wednesdays, laying over in Portland on Sunday. This will give the river an appearance of activity at least.—Statesman.

IMPORTANT THOUGHTFULNESS.—Dr. A. H.

Diveus, postmaster and merchant of Waldport, is in the city this week attending court. He states that the bridge across the slough at Waldport is completed, and accepted by the county court. This slough has long been the great barrier to the construction of a wagon road connecting Waldport with the Alsea valley. This road was completed to the head of Tidewater last summer within nine miles of Waldport. There has been considerable work done since, so that there now only remains a gap of about six miles to complete the road. The citizens of that section have subscribed about 300 days work, and it is expected to leave the road completed by the first of April, 1933, when there will be a through road from Corvallis to Waldport. This road will be of great advantage to that section, and as the Alsea bry and Yachats has preeminent advantages as a summer resort, people can get there without going in a rough-a-bout way.

Hon. D. P. Thompson, of Portland, has received the appointment of minister to Turkey, to succeed Hon. Sol. Hirsch, who resigned. He will leave Washington for Constantinople about Dec. 3rd.
