

LOCAL NOTES.

RAILROAD AFFAIRS.

T. E. HOGG SUCCEEDED IN THE RECEIVER-SHIP BY E. W. HADLEY. According to announcement under which the GAZETTE last week left the railroad case, court convened at 1 o'clock on Saturday afternoon for the hearing of two motions—one for the postponement of sale for 90 days; the other for a change of receivers. The petition for postponement occupied the attention of Judge Fullerton until 4 o'clock. Argument on the question assumed a quadrangular shape. Attorney Gest, for the Blair bondholders, stuck for his original motion for postponement. Messrs. Bryson for the Farmer's Loan and Trust Company, and Brough and Flynn for the present management and Lithiumum for holders of receiver's certificates, all opposed the postponement, but disagreed on other points. Lithiumum wanted the road offered and sold for what it would bring; Mr. Brough strenuously contested against such a proposition; and Mr. Bryson steadily contended for the sale as advertised, arguing trenchantly against delays which were keeping needy employes out of their earnings, and getting the matter deeper and deeper into debt and complication the longer it was put off. Mr. Gest spoke earnestly of the good faith in which the Blair bondholders were acting, and tried to convince the court that only by them would be raised the necessary cash to pay employes and creditors. Only give them time and the probabilities are they will do the rest. Judge Fullerton stood solidly upon his original grounds: "Pay the employes or no postpone." After considerable argument over a proposition of Mr. Gest's suggesting that his party furnish some \$40,000 to pay employes, for which there should be issued to them receiver's certificates that should be preferred above all other claims, the matter finally rested. Pay money or postpone was Judge Fullerton's steady decision. "The sale will proceed next Tuesday, March 7th."

REGARDING THE DEATH OF MRS. MASONFIELD. Regarding the death of Mrs. Masonfield—or Mrs. Norton, so called—at Yaquina, some weeks ago, C. E. Masonfield, husband of the deceased, called at this office, one day during the week for the purpose of submitting evidence calculated to clear away the alleged suspicion which had been brooded about that section against him. He produced the following certificate, which explains itself, and requested its publication: "NEWPORT, March 3, 1893. 'This is to certify that I attended the lady, Mrs. Margaret M. Masonfield, and to the best of my belief the cause of death was blood poisoning and congestion of the lungs.' BENNETT WARREN, M. D. Masonfield had come down from Walla Walla as soon as the reports as published came to his knowledge. He went to the bay to investigate the matter. He pronounced the stories defaming him as an infamous pack of falsehoods; said that he staid at Yaquina some ten days after the death of his wife; that no such report was ever broached while he was there, but the whole thing was sprung after he had gone back to Walla Walla. The fact that Masonfield came straight back to the scene of the trouble some ten days after the death of his wife, and his public exhibition of the case to the prejudice of the man, now cheerfully gives place to his version of it to the end that he may stand cleared of any damaging imputation, so far as this paper is concerned."

THE GAME LAW. Under the new game laws grouse, quail, pheasant, China pheasant, silver, golden, copper, green or Japanese, bob-white, jack-snipe or prairie chicken can only be killed from October 15th to November 15th, and it is against the law to transport them any other time. Trout can only be sold in September and October. It makes it a misdemeanor to hunt or kill deer between December 1st and August 1st of the year following, or on any day between one hour after sunset and one half hour before sunrise. The killing of a spotted fawn at any season is a misdemeanor. The law provides that every person who shall between the 15th day of November and the first day of August of the following year kill or take, except for breeding purposes, or shall offer for sale any grouse pheasant, Mongolian pheasant, quail, or partridge shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The penalty for the violation of this act is fixed at a fine not less than \$50 nor more than \$300 or confinement in the county jail for three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. A GRAND TIME. THE CITIZENS OF LINCOLN COUNTY INAUGURATE IN FORMAL STYLE. Friday last the 31 day of March, 1893, was a gala day for the citizens of the new county of Lincoln. It was the day of formal establishment of separate government and the assumption by the several officials chosen of the duties devolving upon them as wardens of the public interests for a year and a quarter to come. To dignify the event in a becoming manner people from all sections of the country assembled at Toledo and joined in a regular levee feast of jollity, peace and good will to men. Probably 500 citizens of the home county were in the assembly. Many citizens of Corvallis and various sections of the outside world were present. Various delegations were met at the depot and landing as they arrived and were escorted decorously to headquarters to the unenvying strains of a good brass band. Blake hall, at Toledo, the building that has been secured for use as a court house and for county business generally, was made the scene of the inauguration exercises. Here the new officers—a list of whom has been published in the GAZETTE—were duly installed. After this came speeches by Messrs. Bousall, Crosno, Brassfield, Stevens, Dr. Carter, Samuel Case, Dr. Davis and others, all voicing the heartfelt congratulations for the new institution and pledging their best support for its splendid up-building and thirteenth progress. In the evening a grand ball took place at the hall, which was attended by 130 couples of merry dancers, besides many spectators. A notable feature of the occasion was the banquet tables which continued during the evening so long as there was a person who had an appetite to partake, seating before the guests everything palatable which the fat of the land could produce, and which was most hospitably bestowed to all in a spirit of the heartiest generosity. The new county starts out in good hope and favorable auspices. It has energetic and capable men enough within its borders to send it right along on the high road to prosperity from the turn-out. A reasonable amount of harmony and patriotic cooperation among them is all that is needed to put them through nicely. The utmost confidence is felt by the general public for the various officers in charge of their affairs. This is a good omen. Lincoln county starts off all right. PNEUMONIA.
