#### CITY LEGISLATURE.

AN INTERESTING AND IMPORTANT MEETING OF THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Last Monday evening was held an important meeting of the city council. The meeting was held for the first time in the elegant and commodious council chamber in the new city hall building. All the members of the council were present except Eglin, and the visitors and numerous candidates for night policeman filled the room to overflowing. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved. Report of street committee on the petition for a sidewalk on the west side of block No. 5, original townsite of Corvallis, was adopted and sidewalk ordered built. Report of street committee on the petition of W. H. Howard and others for the construction of a sidewalk from VanBerden street along 11th to 16th, and from 16th to Harrison was adopted, and improvements ordered. Street committee reported favorably on petition of W. O. Heskart and others for sidewalk. Report adopted and sidewalk ordered built. Finance committee reported favorably on bills of Niagara Mill Co. as follows: \$138.50, \$12.58, \$63.66, \$65.12, which were ordered paid. Bill of \$41.10 reduced to \$36.99, \$5.28 to \$4.75, and ordered paid. Bill of J. L. Cane for labor, was reduced from \$10 to \$7.50 by finance committee, and ordered paid. Bills of Simpson, Huston & Co. for \$85.37, J. A. Oarey for \$1.25, L. W. Clifton \$1.75, Corvallis Times \$67.50, S. T. Jeffrey \$200 were referred to finance committee. Report of city hall committee was read showing that they had in possession \$1000 belonging to Wm. Butler, city hall contractor, accompanied by an order permitting them to pay the same to his creditors who had furnished material for the building, and further recommended that a payment of 40 per cent on said claims be made. Reports of police judge, treasurer and chief of police were read and referred to finance committee. The police judge reported that he had complied with ordinance No. 47 in advertising for proposals for sealed bids for water works amounting to \$50,000, and that the bids received were as follows: Deitz, Dennison & Prior, per and \$777 premium. Richard M. Hurd, per and expenses of \$450 for lithographing. J. W. Hayes & Sons, per \$2160 premium. Equitable Mortgage Co. per. Lamprecht Bros & Co., per, secured interest and a premium of \$2113.50, and furnish blanks for bonds and guarantee to cash coupons free of charge at banking house in New York. Spitzer & Co., per and a premium of \$1227 and accrued interest. Igo Steinhart, per and a premium of \$690. Larson Leach & Co., per and a premium of \$5. N. W. Harris & Co., per and a premium of \$1575. George A. Lewis & Co., per and a premium of \$375. C. H. White & Co., per and a premium of \$1550. On motion the city attorney was authorized to draft an ordinance accepting the bid of Lamprecht Bros. & Co. for \$50,000 in city bonds, and that the police judge be instructed to make all contracts with said Lamprecht Bros., necessary to carry out said sale of bonds. A communication was read from Max Friendly in reference to the price of lumber. The following bills were ordered paid: A. Cuthren, treasurer's salary, \$263.15. C. L. Blakeslee, \$1.00. Morning Oregonian, adv. bonds, 45.00. J. W. Dunn, work, 10.00. A. Hartaway, " 6.22. O. J. Tress, hauling, 1.00. City Transfer Co., 5.50. Berry & Armstrong, 13.25. Electric Light Co., wood, 3.25. J. M. Porter, police judge, 50.00. M. J. Ervin, night police, 56.00. Water Co., 50.50. J. R. Strafford, chief police, 60.00. J. R. Smith & Co., hardware, 9.45. W. O. Heckard, work, 27.00. P. M. Zeroff, misc., 5.40. The resignation of M. J. Ervin as night policeman was read and on motion accepted. Applications for the position of night policeman were read from the following candidates: W. J. Barker, C. Scott, F. R. Overlander, O. C. McLagan, G. W. Emerick, W. B. Barge, J. I. Applegate, W. Kyle, J. A. Wood and E. Cline. Councilman Hartless presented a motion that the council go into a committee on the whole to elect a night policeman, which motion was overruled by Mayor Burnett, who claimed that the election should be by ballot. The second ballot resulted in a tie vote for McLagan and Applegate, and three successive ballots failed to break the deadlock. The ordinance was read first, second and third times and passed authorizing the police judge to make a contract with Lamprecht Bros. & Co., for the sale of the water bonds. An ordinance for the bonding of the city hall indebtedness to the amount of \$12,000, reached a second reading. On motion, council adjourned until next Saturday evening.

#### OREGON PACIFIC NEWS.

ANOTHER STEP FOR YAQUINA ROUTE—SEVERAL IMPORTANT CHANGES.

A San Francisco dispatch of March 12th says that the Oregon Development Company has announced that its steamer, the Willamette Valley, running between San Francisco and Yaquina bay, and connecting at the latter place with trains of the Oregon Pacific railway company which would hereafter run the steamer on its ocean division. W. B. Webster, the representative of the Oregon Development Company, who has been general freight and passenger agent of the steamship service for several years, has turned over his office to the new managers of the Development company. The new officers of the ocean division of the Oregon Pacific railway are: R. E. Mulohy, general superintendent; E. W. Hadley, receiver; D. R. Vaughn, general agent; P. W. Johnson, freight and passenger agent, and A. J. Storrs, captain of the steamer Willamette Valley. Captain H. Watson, the purchasing agent of the steamship line, will still remain chief of the commissary department. Messrs. Mulohy and Hadley have been in San Francisco for several days, and will remain until Tuesday, when the steamer will return north. They say that the ocean service is to be increased by the addition of a 2000 ton steamer, and that instead of trips every 10 days the two steamers will be able to run on schedule every five days. The time between San Francisco and Yaquina bay is 49 hours. The following interview with Mr. C. H. Geat by an Oregonian reporter, makes further explanation of the Oregon Pacific affairs: "We have had the sale of the Oregon Pacific continued until June 23rd. The object of the continuance is to place the property of the company in the hands of an impartial receiver, and also for the purpose of obtaining sufficient time to send expert men to the mountains to determine the value of an extension of the line to that section. Judge Fullerton, in granting the continuance, required as a condition that at least \$40,000 should be paid the employees upon their claims for back pay. Through the efforts of the new receiver the sum of \$50,000 was obtained and placed in the hands of Blair & Co., of New York, for this purpose. The necessary papers will be prepared and sent east as soon as possible, and we hope to be able to pay the men within two weeks. The back pay due them aggregates \$100,000 or over, and has been in arrears since April 1, 1892. The road will undoubtedly be sold June 28th. The new receiver will be able to meet monthly claims regularly. Mr. Hadley is now in San Francisco. In a dispatch to me he states that a new office of our steamship line has been established there and a large reduction made in the expenses."

NEW YORK, March 15.—A certified copy of the order of Judge Fullerton, of the circuit of Oregon, removing T. Egerton Hogg, of New York, as receiver of the Oregon Pacific and appointing in his place Everett W. Hadley, of Corvallis, Or., was received today by the bondholders' committee. It was served on Hogg at the office of the company, but he did not furnish the combinations to the keys to allow the committee to obtain possession of the books which they contain. He cannot be punished in New York city for contempt of court for refusing to obey an order of the court of Oregon. The motion will be argued before Judge Ingraham, in the supreme court chambers, Friday, for confirmation here of Judge Fullerton's order.
