All old residents, says the Dalles Times-Mountaineer, feel certain that the June freshet will cause the Columbia to overflow its banks considerably. OREGON IS GETTING THERE.

Mr. George T. Myers, president of the World's fair commission, reports everything as progressing favorably, and that there is no doubt that the Oregon exhibit will be in Chicago and in place on time for the opening on May 1st. This is, of course, upon the basis of the representations made up to date by the heads of the departments in the field gathering and preparing the same. No relaxation of effort should be made in any quarter, however, that might cause any delay. The Oregon commission are doing their best to arrange with the management so that new fresh fruits and products can be added to the exhibit as the season arrives for them to mature. Whether they will succeed or not is as yet a question.

Mr. Myers says that the fishermen have responded nobly and will have a magnificent exhibit in his department of salmon and other fish from the Columbia and southern Oregon rivers and from the coast bays.

A BIG TIMBER DEAL.

A hardwood deal of considerable magnitude is reported to have been consummated at this place on Wednesday last, involving a no less historical location than the Greenberry Smith island, a few miles south of Corvallis. Max Friendly, of this city, was the purchaser. The tract comprises 1200 acres of the choicest ash and maple timber in this section of the state. A nominal price was paid and the timber, being easy of access to the Willamette river, can be rafted to the mills at slight expense and placed on the market at a reasonable figure.

SCHOONER WRECKED.

Concerning the vessel that came ashore at Yaquina Wednesday afternoon, particulars are very meagre. A note received by Cam Hemphill from his father, living on the bay, states that the wreck is a 3-mast schooner; that she floated in on the tide at 1 o'clock p. m., Wednesday and grounded on South beach, inside the jetty, opposite the south beach hotel. She is a large vessel and is full of water. The Albany Herald learned that the name of the schooner is the "Alto Blanchard," but nothing else as to her identity, nationality, crew or cargo had been reported at last accounts in this city. It seems that Receiver Hatley and Supt. Mulcahy, of the O. P. company were informed of the wreck Wednesday evening, and immediately took a special for the bay with the hope of assisting the vessel off the sands with the tug at Yaquina. Mr. Hemphill states in his note that she will go to pieces.

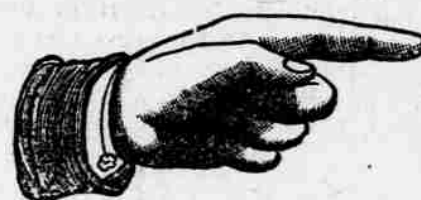
