OREGON PACIFIC LEAVES.

A special train leaves Albany for Yaquina on Sunday next at 2 p. m. The indications are that the river will remain at a good boating stage until late in the summer.

Receiver Hadley was over to the bay this week looking after the company's interests in the Alice Blanchard, recently released.

Under the present river schedule the boats tie up at this city. This arrangement better enables the company to meet the demands on the river craft.

The rolling stock and track is being improved and repaired so that now trains make as good, if not better time over a portion of the road than any other road in the state.

The government snag-boat is now engaged in removing obstructions in the river above Harrisburg, and should she complete the work before the water is too low, the Hoag will bring an excursion party from Eugene to Harrisburg or this city.

The steamer Willamette Valley arrived at Yaquina from San Francisco on Thursday afternoon with 24 passengers. As usual, a train started eastward at once with the passengers and perishable freight. The vessel sails Saturday with 750 tons of freight.

A special train will leave Yaquina on Saturday afternoon for Albany to carry the Corbett excursionists. The train will pass Corvallis at 6:30, and return to Corvallis after the entertainment. The fare for the round trip from Corvallis has been fixed at 50 cents.

The Willamette valley merchants' excursion to San Francisco on the 27th inst., promises to be well patronized. It is creating considerable interest in the City of the Golden Gate, and the excursionists may expect the best kind of treatment by the business men of San Francisco.

Some time ago the company began to repair and repaint all of the rolling stock of the road. Next week two passenger coaches, a mail car and an engine will come out of the shops and will take the place of the regular passenger. Other cars will at once take the place of these in the shops.
