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DISCORDANT NOTES.

The Oregon democratic brass band are not discoursing the most harmonious music to be desired by those in the front ranks of the political procession. The discordancy is occasioned by rivalry for the leadership.

The democrats are just now gathering the fruits of their bad management of the presidential campaign in Oregon last fall. It will be remembered that orders came from democratic headquarters for the regular electors to withdraw, and that the Oregon democrats support the people's party electors. This the democratic electors, except Bob Miller, refused to do, and the result was a division in the ranks. The contention now is, of course, for the offices. Spud Murphy of Portland and J. R. Markley of Corvallis, committeemen, represent the fusion element and Messrs. Colvig, Butcher and Nolan, electors, represent the straight-out faction. Cleveland is disposed to favor the fusionists as the famous order originated from Chairman Harrity of the national committee, but this course would make a political bedfellow of Penoyer. The president does not wish to sustain any such intimate relationship to our governor, and his hesitation keeps our democratic friends upon the anxious seat. M. W. Colvig is out in an open letter in which he says, among other things:

"I think the appointment of E. C. Russell as appraiser of the port clearly indicates that the active, responsible democrats of the state need not apply for positions.

"I have written to the Hon. H. H. Gilfrey to immediately withdraw my application for the Alaska judgeship from the files of the attorney general's office. Loyalty to democratic principles seems to be regarded as an element of weakness, rather than strength, by the appointing power.

"A lot of mercenary adventurers, blown here from the four quarters of the earth, have succeeded in establishing themselves at the head of the democratic party in Oregon and the administration is being deceived by them.

"The real true, earnest and active members of the party are totally ignored. Its best element is not consulted, nor listened to by the president. A set of men have assumed leadership whom it would be childish to follow.

Without either good judgment or political honesty, they have at all times and upon every occasion been willing to surrender principles for the seeming advantage of any villainous policy or expediency that presents itself.

"Dan Murphy and John Markley are now in Washington representing this element—but misrepresenting the best interests of the public service, and the democratic party of the state."

The Oregonian's Washington correspondent, under date of May 22d, says: "There is trouble in Oregon's democratic camp here. For about a week Murphy and Markley have not been able to do anything. Both of them announced their intention of leaving last week, but just as they apparently were going to have things in shape, so that anything they asked in a small way in the department would be honored, trouble arose. Other Oregon democrats have insisted that some recognition shall be given the Cleveland men in Oregon. Russell has been declared a Penoyer democrat. Cleveland and the cabinet officers have been informed that if Murphy and Markley continue to run things the state will be turned over to Penoyer. The democrats who have been here and failed to receive recognition have been fighting, and they are assisted by some of the leaders in Oregon. It is asserted by some that if the appointment of an appraiser were to be made again Russell would not be selected.

PATIENT DEMOCRACY.

The democratic party is a very patient beast of burden, so long as it gets its feed regularly. Nothing stirs it to revolt except deprivation of the offices. Everything else it endures from Grover Cleveland without a murmur. He may suspend the Geary law it forced upon the last administration, antagonize the silver law put upon the statute books by an alliance between the mine-owners and the solid South, repudiate the revenue tariff plank of the Chicago platform; he may flout the most cherished principles of the democratic party and defeat its dearest desires, after the supreme hunger for office; he may do all this and retain its allegiance, so long as he permits the distribution of patronage to continue. The democrats bear the autocratic rule of Cleveland in office as patiently as they bore his cool assumption of the right of elevation to office. He is not more detested now by the mass of the party than he was before the Chicago convention met. His rule is endured now, as it was accepted then, because the democracy believes now, as it believed then, that nobody else but he can give it the offices. These are the vital things to it. Principles are nothing, personal dignity is nothing, so long as democrats can draw salaries from the government. No other party in the history of the country ever submitted so abjectly to the rule of a political and intellectual alien, for the mere sake of the offices. The republican party never bred such an autocrat; indeed, it has unseated leaders of greater power and less pretensions because they assumed too much authority. There is only one political beast of burden in the country.—Oregonian.

ABOUT WOOL.

The following is from a letter by one of the heavy wool buyers of Oregon: "Our advices from the east are very discouraging. There is such an uneasy feeling prevailing as to the proposed tariff legislation by a special session of congress, liable to be convened at any time. In fact we have what we deem authentic information that such a session, for said purpose is more than likely to be called and values will depend upon what is done. The uncertainty, however, is what makes all connected with the wool industry, including manufacturers, very timid. I am sorry to be unable to give you more definite information at present, but assure you that when I learn more cheerful news I shall be happy to impart same to you."

ANOTHER PROCLAMATION.

Under date of May 22d, an Astoria dispatch says there was a good deal of excitement in Chinatown on that date when a long-expected document from the headquarters of the Six Companies, at San Francisco arrived and was posted up on a prominent corner of the city. It was handwritten. The following is a translation:

"To our Astoria brothers, and especially to those who do canny work: Your officers need not telegraph to us any more. You may feel secure. A cablegram was received from Prince Li Hung Chang yesterday. He says that our imperial government is sending a commissioner on the next steamer to see President Cleveland in Washington. He knows what to say, and the American law will be altered when he tells the American president what the emperor desires. Do not be afraid or leave the country. You will not be made to register. The men in the Astoria canneries are good residents, and we want them to be careful not to offend any American officials, because we will prove that great damage will be done by sending you out of the country. Nobody who is working will be sent away. We will send you word again soon."

George H. Ball, of Perrydale, Polk county, has a breed of Shanghai chickens, a number of which have 15 toes. With this extra supply of toes on his chickens there is small likelihood of Mr. Ball raising much garden "sassa" this year.

NOT CONCLUSIVE EVIDENCE.

The following excerpt is from Bradstreet's, and is not conclusive evidence of democratic economy: "According to the official statement recently completed by the clerks to the committees on appropriations of the senate and house, the total appropriations made during the session, including the permanent appropriations for interest, sinking fund, etc., amounted to \$519,504,359, which is an increase of nearly \$12,000,000 as compared with the appropriations for the preceding session. By the legislation of the session there were created 939 specified new offices, including 750 additional appointments for the navy, at an annual cost of \$383,010; 186 specified offices were abolished or omitted from the appropriations, at an annual cost of \$214,889, and new offices or employments not specific as to number or rates of compensation, and principally in the postal service throughout the country, were authorized, at an annual expenditure of \$889,012, while the annual reduction made on this account amounted to \$23,900.—Times-Mountaineer.

The new U. S. cruiser, New York, on her third trial run on Monday, broke the world's record and won for her builders the largest premium ever paid in any country. When 21 knots was predicted as the speed for the new cruiser, many hoped, but few believed, her engines would ever be able to drive such an immense mass of steel through the water at this rate. When she crossed the line, however, with a speed of 21.09 knots through the water, and some corrections yet to be added for tide, the enthusiasm on board was intense. This gives the United States not only the most perfect, but the swiftest armored cruising vessel. The cost of the New York, exclusive of premiums for excess of speed, was in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000. Her guaranteed speed was to be 20 knots for four consecutive hours. For each quarter of a knot in excess of that her builders, Cramp & Sons, are to receive \$1,000.

When we observe that it was the republicans of the supreme bench that held the Geary act constitutional, and that it was those eminent democrats, Chief Justice Miller and Justice Field, who declared against the law and sustained the absolutism of the president, a state of facts is presented that at least will embarrass the demagogues of democrats on the Chinese question hereafter.—Oregonian.

Into this place of disorder came some sixteen hundred students every year. The best citizens were aroused here, as they will ever be in such educational centers, to the need of reform. We have at hand two letters from two gentlemen who were active in the work from which we glean a few thoughts.

The great meeting which Dr. Wright was called to address was a union meeting of the churches for men only, and some thousand voters listened to his eloquent sensible remarks.
