

FOREIGN IMMIGRATION.

The subject of foreign immigration has heretofore been too lightly handled by both the republican and democratic parties from the evident fear of arraying the foreign vote against that on which should treat the subject as it deserves. The United States no longer invites to its shores the oppressed of all nations. It now has a sufficient number of those for all purposes, and too many who imagine they belong to that class. Congress recently enacted legislation which is satisfactory so far as the Chinese are concerned if the laws are executed. When the missionary sentiment of the East was once overcome this legislation was possible because the Chinese could not become voters. There are other classes of foreign immigrants who are fully as objectionable as the Chinese as regards their ability to underbid the American in the field of labor, and are the more undesirable because they may have a voice in administrative affairs. Home protection and free immigration are antagonistic theories and it is plain which should be adopted to the rejection of the other. Since we have recovered from the slight twinge of conscience suffered from the anti-Chinese laws we should administer a similar dose of legislation to some of the other foreigners.

At a recent session of the United States senatorial commission which is investigating the subject of immigration at the port of New York the testimony related to the imports of laborers. Several witnesses stated they came to this country with the promise of work and in some instances had their fare paid. Giovanni Lordi, a banker, testified that he knew many Italian contractors were engaged in making contracts abroad for laborers for railroad companies. A majority of the Italians were landed in New York and then spread over the country. Witness said he realized a big profit in transmitting money to Italy for his customers. There were about 100 places similar to his in New York. He remitted to Italy never less than \$2,000,000 a year, but did not expect to remit more than \$1,000,000 this year. He estimated that \$2,000,000 was sent to Italy last year by the Italians working here.

The gates of the world's fair grounds were open last Sunday, but a rain and thunder storm and threatening weather partly accounted for the small attendance. The New England states' buildings and those of a number of other states remained closed. There is another feature of the Sunday opening which calls for the complaints of the visitors. Many of the finest exhibits in the manufactures and other departmental buildings were hidden from the view of visitors, because their exhibitors, or their agents in charge, did not propose to work seven days in the week. The coverings, which protected the exhibits at night, were not removed, and all the visitors could see were big ornamental booths and show-cases disfigured with canvas, wood or iron sheeting. The exposition authorities have no right to remove the coverings without permission of the exhibitors, and no arrangement has yet been made for unveiling Sundays. Not even a flag was to be seen on the buildings of Great Britain, Canada, New South Wales and India, and the doors were locked. Visitors were denied access to the great display of the United States government in the big domed building and the small adjuncts. Machinery hall was as silent as it was last Sunday.

"For want of funds" the dispatches seldom give the full title of our royal Spanish visitor, which is (take a long breath) Marie Eulalie Francisca de Asis Margarita Roberta Isabel Francisca de Paula Christina Maria de la Piedad, Infanta of Spain. She proved a very expensive visitor. She smokes cigarettes, bets on horse races, and all in all we'd about as soon be afflicted with an epidemic of infantum cholera.

THE "INFANTA EULALIE."

There are times when persons, whose business does not require them to read all the newspapers, are inclined to call for a respite from the inordinate discussion of some subjects. It is not strange, therefore, that editors, in perusing their vast numbers of exchanges, sometimes become weary and worn from visual contact with display headings concerning some matter of very little interest except to a few. The changes have been rung on the "Infanta Eulalie," who it might be supposed by anyone not acquainted with royal nomenclature, is some sort of an infant; but in reality she is the full-grown aunt of the child king of Spain. In view of Spain's connection with the discovery of America congress thought it the proper thing to invite the ruling powers of that country to visit the Columbian exhibition. The queen regent named her sister, Eulalie, as her personal representative. The Duke of Veragua was also invited as a descendant of Columbus, but the Infanta refused to come in company with the Duke, so he preceded her and put the government to double expense of entertaining its Spanish guests. The Infanta required, it she came at all, to be accorded the "attention and honors due to royalty," and among other things she would expect the president to call on her. This part of the program was discussed at length by the newspapers. Now, Mr. Cleveland may have his faults, but snobbishness is not one of them. He draws the line at making calls—is too busy for that sort of thing. He informed the Spanish minister that if the Infanta chose to come to the United States she should have the best of everything to be had, but that he would make no call; that if she wanted to see him, he could be found at the white house. The matter of her coming was in abeyance for some time, but she finally came, and refused the apartments selected for her in a swell New York hotel because the rooms had been previously occupied by the Duke of Veragua, a "mere subject," as she styled him. Her every movement is minutely described, and the details of the ball given in her honor in New York makes reading which is humiliating to an every-day American. Early in the evening the lady "held a drawing room" at which those in attendance were expected to observe the etiquette of the Spanish court—that is, they must advance half doubled up, kneel at the Infanta's feet and kiss her hand. In retiring they must retain the bent posture and walk backwards. A goodly number of the "four hundred" accomplished this difficult feat with grace, and so runs the whole proceeding of entertaining this personage. The result of her visit has been the sacrifice of considerable common American pride, and to strengthen the aversion for American "high society."

Hon. D. P. Thompson, ex-minister to Turkey, arrived home yesterday morning says Saturday's Oregonian. 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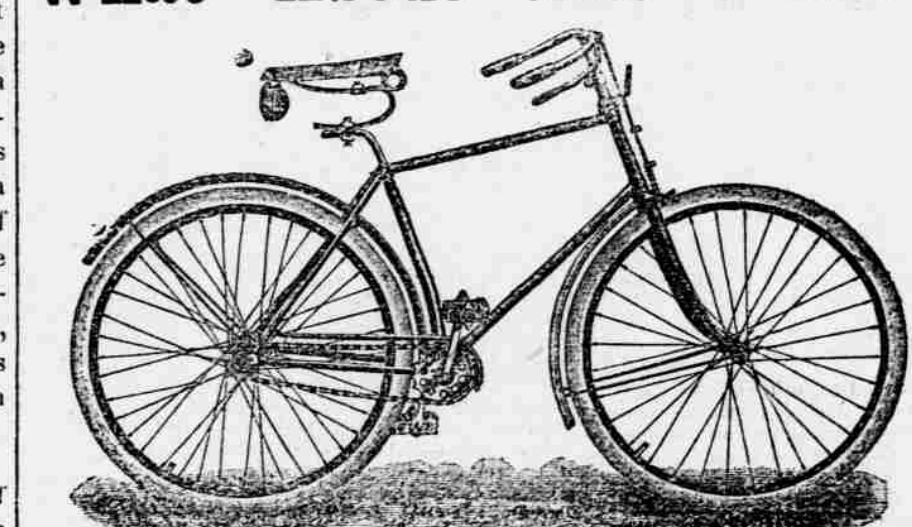
