NEW TO THE LINE.

There is a large amount of money now being spent for street improvements in the city of Corvallis, and to the injustice of charging the cost to the general city fund there is the added objection that the work is not being done in a systematic manner, in that it does not conform to the grades as established by a careful survey.

Not long since, the city paid between \$600 and \$700 for a survey which established a uniform system of street grades. This was regarded as a necessary preliminary to street improvement, and it was. The objections to working to the established grade are that the services of an engineer would be necessary and that the cost of grading the streets in conformity with the survey would be too great. The first objection is not well founded for the reason that aside from the propriety of doing the work properly, an engineer could set the grade stakes on a number of streets in a very short time, after which the work could be prosecuted as indicated without his presence.

There is no doubt that the present four-dollar-a-day street superintendent or some other one could follow the directions of the grade stakes. The additional expense of the actual grading could not be very great because the streets are comparatively level, and the grades are established with a view to economy in construction as well as to surface drainage and appearance. The old method of working county roads ought not to prevail in the street work in a city of the pretensions of Corvallis. The rainy season shows up the defects of the old way to great advantage. Councilman Waggoner has persistently fought the pottering method of street improvement and it is sincerely hoped that other members will see the merits of his position. A large amount of promises work had been done on Second and Madison streets prior to their improvement according to modern plans. All could see the chagrin of property-owners on these streets who were compelled to pay about 25 cents per foot to have hauled away from in front of their property the gravel which had cost them a dollar per load; then, when "grade" was reached pay 75 cents per yard to have it returned. This was a result of previous haphazard methods. It is the custom now for the city to gravel here and there without regard to established grades, and some day somebody will have to pay heavily to have it dug up and hauled away, or pay to have it covered with loose earth, then more gravel. Since we need street improvements, the council may as well take the bull by the horns at once, order the work according to the provisions of the charter and assess the cost against the property affected.

A STORY OF THE DAY.

The first chapter of a story, now running in the annals of the courts, entitled "The Children's Heritage," or "The Lost School Fund," was concluded in this city last Saturday. The legend relates that a certain legislature at a certain time passed an act for the dismemberment of a certain county of Oregon named Benton; that a new county, named Lincoln, was formed from the western half of Benton; that the school fund of the original county was divided with the new county, but that the county named Lincoln desired a further division the same as though no apportionment had been made. The legend goes on in substance as follows: Upon application of Chas. Booth, superintendent of schools for Lincoln county, a writ was granted, in said county, on the 17th day of May, by Circuit Judge Fullerton, requiring the superintendent of Benton county to apportion to the several districts within the county of Lincoln their pro rata proportion of the said school fund for the year 1893 the same as if said county had not been created, etc., or that he appear at chambers before the judge at Corvallis on the 10th day of June, and show cause why he had not made such apportionment. Mr. Bryan, the Benton county superintendent, did not appear on the fund as commanded, but appeared before the judge at the place and date named, and by his attorneys moved for a dismissal of the writ on the grounds afforded by section 604 of Oregon laws, which requires that similar actions shall be conducted in the county in which the defendant exercises his functions. The action having been commenced in Lincoln county, the judge dismissed the writ and assessed the costs against the plaintiff.

Mr. Bryan was thus miraculously rescued from the clutches of the Lincoln county court. This would be a charming finale to the story, but whether it will be a serial remains to be seen.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

All the members of the council were present at an adjourned session on the evening of June 12, Mayor McFadden in the chair. Bills to the amount of \$1,646.93 were allowed, including \$124.75 of Mr. Ray, as superintendent of city hall construction, \$303.00 for road grading machine, and \$132.50, bill of S. T. Jeffreys as city attorney.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to pay all laborers \$2.00 per day from and after May 1, 1893.

Quarterly report of city treasurer was read and approved. The bond of J. M. Davis, as chief of police, was presented for approval, but the mayor ruled that action on the same was out of order because Mr. Davis had not been chosen to the office by the number of votes necessary to his election, he having received but four votes of the nine councilmen. This decision was appealed from but the mayor's ruling was sustained by seven members of the council.

A motion to proceed to ballot for chief of police was carried. The application of Geo. Avery was read, also applications on file, of J. M. Davis, J. R. Scrafton, C. B. Wells and E. H. Taylor. The result of the ballot was, Davis four votes, Taylor five votes. Five votes being a majority of all the council, E. H. Taylor was declared duly elected to the office of chief of police.

A motion to proceed to the election of a policeman, or night watch, was carried. The name of O. C. McLagan was presented and the result of the ballot was McLagan six, blank three.

The council accepted Max Friend's proposition to furnish lumber of a specified quality, at \$8 per thousand, cash, or \$5.40 in city orders.

The delinquent assessment roll was turned in and the police judge ordered to issue warrant directing chief of police to collect same.

L. G. Altman was chosen to act as president of the council during the ensuing year.

The mayor then appointed the following standing committees: Street, Lee, Creighton and Altman; finance, Eglin, Gibson and Wilson; health, Waggoner, Creighton and Lee.

ROAD WORK.

The road machines recently purchased by the county have proven a great success as is evidenced by the result accomplished on the state road in a short time. The railroad plow is a necessary auxiliary of the machine and the amount paid for the one in use was money well spent. The work now progressing on the state road looks very much like the county means business. This thoroughfare is beautifully graded from Corvallis to the Record bridge, a distance of five miles, and it seems like a dream to those who traveled the road, the past winter. At one point the workmen recovered several hundred rails and a couple of cords of wood which had been thrown into the uninviting quagmire at various times to facilitate passage. At this particular place the boys rather expected to unearth the remains of horses, wagons and human beings, but such evidence of the former condition of the road did not come to light.

In the next road district south of the Record place we understand that the farmers did not show up to apply their road work while the machine was ready to assist them, so it was taken to the Buttes, where considerable of the road had been plowed up ready for the scraper, and it was operated in that locality this week.

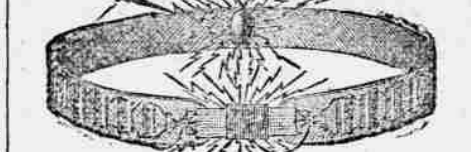
