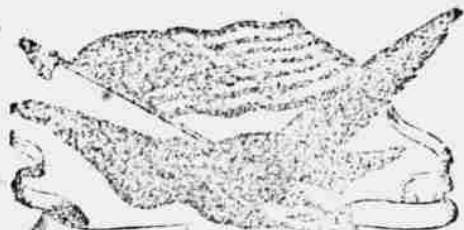

The school will be organized at the opera house on Saturday, July 1st, at 2 o'clock. They will also give instructions in the evening of the same day beginning at 7:30. Receiver Hadley and Supt. Mulcally passed over the road on a tour of inspection Tuesday and Wednesday, and made partial arrangements for handling this year's crop.
