Train will leave Corvallis at 7:30; returning, leave Yaquina at 7 p. m. The usual fishing excursion to sea will be made during the day.

At his residence in this city, August 20th, 1893, James C. Jacobs died of cerebral affection at the age of 61 years. The remains were buried in Mountain View cemetery under the auspices of the A. O. U. W., of which order he was a member. Mr. Jacobs was a pioneer citizen, and an industrious and honorable man. He leaves a wife and six children.

Captain Chris Paulsen, who intends to cross the Atlantic in a 16-foot Norwegian skiff, started on his perilous trip on the 17th. The boat will carry two tanks, holding 100 gallons of water. Provisions for only two weeks can be stowed away, owing to the smallness of the craft. He will depend on meeting the trans-Atlantic steamers to replenish his store of provisions and water.

O. P. MATTERS.

The report that Supt. Mulcahy, of the Oregon Pacific company, had been in San Francisco to secure another steamer for the Yaquina-San Francisco route is not strictly correct. As is well known the management of the Oregon Pacific have endeavored to obtain the storage of a large amount of grain adjacent to their line, and their efforts, to all indications will be successful. Owing to the scarcity of money it was thought that a considerable portion of this grain, especially oats, would seek the San Francisco market. It once, and that the steamer Willamette Valley might not be able to handle it expeditiously. Mr. Mulcahy, therefore, went to the city for the purpose of ascertaining whether, if he required another vessel, he would be able to obtain it. We understand, he received satisfactory assurances.

The Oregon Pacific, like other roads, is economizing to considerable extent. The operating expenses have lately been reduced \$3,500 per month. The offices at Chitwood, Lyons and Harris have been discontinued temporarily, and the shops at Yaquina are closed for thirty days. The salaries of employees were also subjected to a slight shave.

He was a wonderful singer, eighteen years old, and had been a member of the Monteith family for sixteen years. The remains were conveyed to Albany where the interment took place with appropriate ceremony.

BUILD THE ROAD.

Crook county has a large amount of money to be expended on road work in the near future and there is some discussion as to where it shall be applied. There is a strong disposition to build a wagon road to connect with the eastern terminus of the Oregon Pacific, and as the extension of the railroad may be delayed for an indefinite time it would seem the part of wisdom for the people of Crook county to put the money on the proposed road. In this undertaking the Oregon Pacific could also well afford to give substantial aid to the enterprise. On this subject the Prineville News says:

"This county has now an almost princely sum to be used in building and repairing roads, in fact enough money if properly used and judiciously expended to build and repair all the roads needed. And in the expenditure of this money the people are interested, and if any of our officials think any part of the money can be jugged out to favorites, or wasted, they are mistaken. The road leading towards The Dalles is plenty good enough now, the proposed McPherson canyon road is not. It would cost more than it is worth if it was needed. If we want to open a road leading to a railroad let us head for Albany. The people of this county have had entirely enough of The Dalles. We have felt, paid tribute to, and been robbed by that way station long enough. Let us all pull loose work for ourselves and build up Crook county."

"There is a better market for all we have to sell at Albany than there ever was or will be at The Dalles, and all we want to buy, such as fruit, flour, bacon, lard and such like is far cheaper, so if any of this road money must be spent in reaching a railroad, let it be spent in that direction. Besides all money spent on the McPherson canyon road would simply be so much paid out in the interest of two toll roads."

THE PAINTER OF "THE ANGELUS."

A short way from Paris, on the border of the forest of Fontainebleau, is the little village of Barbizon whose narrow streets, lined with poor stone cottages, are sacred to the memory of a band of artists who lived there painting the surrounding country and seasons. Among the most famous of these Millet stands first, and here he painted "The Angelus," which created such a furor here a few years ago, in a little, dark, unwarmed studio which he had built beside his cottage. Millet was a peasant, and his pictures are songs of the soil, of the sowing, the winnowing, and daily toil, of the poetry and dignity of labor. The fact that he never used a model to paint from is an unique claim to deserve a prominent place, as nothing else does, the remarkable strength of the man's imagination, as well as technique. He did not live to see his pictures generally appreciated; his life was a weary and struggle to get bread for his children; and he died, under distressing circumstances, during a fit of despondency.

"The Angelus," for which \$100,000 has been recently refused, was originally sold for a mere song and it is heartrending when one reads the long list of his pictures, which our American millionaires have paid for so dearly, to think that Millet suffered actual want. "The Knitting," "Les Femmes," "The Sower," in the W. K. Vanderbilt gallery, New York, and "The Shepherd," in Mr. Walter's gallery, Baltimore, are familiar through etchings and engravings. "Going to Work" is not seen so often. On a great rock in the forest of Fontainebleau the French government has fixed in tardy recognition of her celebrated sons—a bronze bas-relief of the heads of Millet and Theodore Rousseau. In life these two artists were real neighbors and great friends; and Rousseau, who was a great landscape painter, often shared his income with Millet, and under the guise of "a rich American," bought several of his pictures when "the wolf was at the door." GRADE THE FRUIT.

The all important subject which should attract the attention of the horticulturist who is raising fruit for market is the one of properly grading the fruit. Even Mr. Grinnel grades his onions before marketing them as will be shown in his excellent article on another page of this issue. Some of the finest fruit that has ever been sent out of the state of Oregon for inspection and criticism, the worst has come back, "It is the finest we ever saw, but it is not properly graded." Then here is the point: fruit buyers and critics are always looking for some point where they can get a hold to run down the fruit and have an excuse for paying less than the article is worth. With the fruit of the Northwest the only point discovered is that it is not properly graded. This is the easiest of all defects to remedy. Grading is something that can be done by anyone that is able to handle fruit. All it requires is pouring the fruit in, turning a crank and then carrying it away. It is not like the drying of fruit, where it requires a man with some experience to cure it exactly right. No man can dry fruit and get the best price for it even if he is an expert, unless it be graded, because it cannot be dried evenly unless first graded. It is simply impossible to dry large fruit and small fruit alike when both are dried together, one will be dried to a chip or the other will be too green to keep. This will, in a great measure, decide the price to be obtained by growers of the Northwest.—Northwest Pacific Farmer.
