FROM ALL THE WORLD.

Items of Interest About People and Things Carefully Corralled.

The population of Utah is estimated at 233,805.

The Columbian liberty-bell will ring at the California midwinter fair.

A gentleman must kiss every lady he is introduced to in Paraguay. It is the custom of the country.

James Barkey, aged 35 years, has been arrested at Walla Walla on a charge of attempting to rape a four-year-old girl.

Upwards of 3,000 lives were lost by a cyclone in Louisiana last Friday. Besides great loss of life, untold damage to property of all kinds resulted.

The populists of Leavenworth, Kan. nominated a lady, Mrs. Eva M. Blackman, for coroner, after a man, who was first named and declined, saying he did not like the office."

The Metropolitan Arena club, of Vicksburg, Miss., has telegraphed Corbett and Mitchell, offering a purse of \$50,000 to have them fight in the arena. It will seat 12,000 people.

At South Bend, Wash., the city clerk's salary was reduced from \$50 to \$15 per month, the city attorney's from \$50 to \$25, and the position of night watchman and fire engineer abolished.

Since August 20 there have been forty-two bank suspensions in the United States. Iowa leads all the other states in the number of suspensions, 8; and Illinois and Kansas follow, with 6 each.

The Rev. B. D. Zweig of Reading, Penn., married his twenty-three hundredth couple on Thursday and gave them a handsome present in token of the event. It is to be hoped he got the customary fee, however.

Mr. John Young of Bridgport, Penn., who celebrated his eightieth birthday on Sunday last was one of fifteen children, nine of whom are still living, and is the father of sixteen children, of whom also nine are living.

For the six months ending June 30 there was a net loss of 1,016 in membership in the New York department of the Grand Army. The death rate is assuming such large proportions that few G. A. R. posts are able to keep their membership from decreasing.

The greatest depth under water ever reached by a driver is believed to have been attained by Captain John Christensen, who went down 196 feet below the surface recently at Elliot Bay, Washington. He remained at that depth in his armor for twenty minutes without inconvenience.

The population of Noble county, Ind., are said to be in possession of conclusive evidence to show that John Connors and Eva Flint, who were arrested at Kendallville last Wednesday in connection with the Lake Shore train robbery, were two of the participants in the distribution of the booty.

Buffalo, N. Y., has the honor of reckoning among her citizens a lineal descendant of Christopher Columbus, the discover of America. His name is Alexius Columbus, and last Saturday he celebrated his 104th birthday anniversary. Alexius was born on the Isle of Orleans, near Quebec, Canada, where his grandfather had settled after his immigration from France. Alexius' father, Peter, was a ship-builder, and Alexius followed the same occupation, first in Canada and later in Buffalo. For many years he also conducted a farm, and most of the old man's time is devoted to gardening. Although 104 years old, he is remarkably well preserved, and appears strong enough to round out another decade.

In the United States district court at San Francisco Oct. 6th, Patrick G. Gleason, a former resident of Oregon, libeled the Oregon Pacific Railway Company's steamship Willamette Valley for \$5,000, which he alleges is due him as damages resulting from unjust and cruel treatment he received from officers of the steamship while aboard her as a passenger. The papers recite that Gleason boarded the Willamette Valley at Yaquina, Oregon, Friday, August 4th, having in his possession a first-class ticket entitling him to cabin passage; that when the steamer put to sea the captain and purser declared his ticket invalid and ejected him from his cabin; that on coming aboard he deposited \$240 in gold coin with the purser, and when ejected from his cabin he offered to buy a steerage passage and authorized the purser to take the price of the same from the amount he had on deposit. This Gleason swears they refused to do, but confined him to the forward part of the ship and gave him no provisions from that time on. He claims to have suffered from starvation and exposure, and asks damages in consequence. Agent Vaughn told the company's side of the story, as follows: "When the Oregon Pacific Railroad gave the board of trade excursion a month or so ago special tickets were issued to points in the Willamette valley at \$10 each. These tickets were not transferable, but Gleason bought the return portion of one at Yaquina and got aboard. He was given a stateroom and when it was discovered that he was not the person to whom the ticket had been originally issued Gleason was told he would be required to pay full first-class fare. This he refused to do, but offered to buy a steerage ticket. This the ship's people refused to allow him to do, and then Gleason, according to Mr. Vaughn's statement, occupied his stateroom or go to his meals in order to avoid paying the first class fare. He was notified that his stateroom was at his disposal, and was called specially at each meal, but preferred to dine in the saloon. Mr. Vaughn stated that Gleason's suit to the court was the result of a quarrel with the purser."

NEWS FROM THE STATE.

Brief Summary of the Happenings in Our Sister Counties of Oregon.

Eugene's school children number 640.

The state insane asylum has 894 inmates.

Typhoid fever cases are numerous at Beaverton.

Astoria's water rates have been reduced 25 per cent.

Polk county's assessment roll lists 308,000 acres of land.

Four hundred bales of hops left Salem Saturday for the east.

Norris Humphrey, of Eugene, picked 40,000 pounds of prunes.

The Harney county hay crop for the year is estimated at 50,000 tons.

The Grand Ronde has marketed 100 carloads of logs the past year.

The Dunsmuir Lumber Co., of East Portland, has been attached for \$29,000.

Hungarian prunes, three inches long, grew on Samuel Daw's trees four miles west of Halsey.

Henry Barnhart has sued the Union Pacific at Baker City for \$30,000 damages sustained in an accident.

E. Schanno, of The Dalles, has sent another large consignment of fruit to the Chicago horticultural exhibit.

It is estimated that the grain yield of Grand Ronde and adjacent valleys will this year be 1,500,000 bushels.

Wallowa county sheep marketed in the east netted \$2 to \$2.60. The shippers are satisfied and will send no more.

A. Vitus and sons have bought for \$18,000 the Samuel Meek farm of 782 acres eight miles northwest of Eugene.

The Eugene warehouses are getting pretty well filled up with hops.

The small around the depot is decidedly strong of the pungent hop.

Prineville is suffering from a coyote plague. Large numbers of the hungry horde surround the town and make the night hideous by their hungry howls.

Some forty odd hoboes arrived in Roseburg from the north on Monday night's freight train. It was the largest crowd of tramps that ever arrived at that station on one train.

James S. Averill was fined seventy-five dollars and costs last week by the circuit court in Curry county, for dealing in deer skins. That is a pretty broad hint to stay out of the deer hide business. It isn't profitable.

The Central Point races were a dismal failure financially. In all the races the entrance fees constituted more than three-fourths of the purse, and the money received by the third horse in a race was less than the entrance fee.

Black wood-peckers are a great pest in Jackson county. They descend upon the orchards in swarms and destroy large quantities of both fall and winter apples. Sportsmen are practicing upon them about Ashland with pea guns and shot guns.

How's thirty-six bushels of Bartlett pears from one tree? That is what one of George Ball's trees did for him last week. Set out more fruit. We will soon have as good an eastern market as California. Set out the best varieties only.—Sheridan Sun.

A large proportion of the surplus cattle of Eastern Oregon will be shipped to Omaha this fall. Fifteen thousand head have been bought in Malheur county for shipment to that point, and about the same amount in Umatilla and Morrow counties.

Henry White and Fred Hill, who went "over the trail" with one bunch, containing 7,000 head of the E. Böttcher sheep drive from Umatilla county, have returned to Pendleton. The drive was successfully made, and stopped at Laramie, Wyo., where 12,000 sheep were delivered to purchasers.
